PERSONAL.

Minister Motley has arrived at Liverpool, and has been officially and courteously received.

Thomas Don Onion, aged 73 years, one of the brave men in the garrison at Fort McHenry when bombarded by the British forces in 1814, died on Friday.

Albert H. Boyd, a conductor of a freight train on the Northern Central Railroad, was instantly killed on Friday while standing on the top of a car; his head striking a bridge.

George Crowley who was arrested at Springfield, Mass., was sentenced to five years in the State Prison for committing a rape on Mrs. Honora Tourney of West Springfield. He is 16 years of age and she 60.

Col. Price had organized a strong expedition against the Indians in Arizona. Many of the recent depredations have been traced to so-called friendly Indians on so-called Government reservations.

Admiral Farragut and Gen Sherman have both sent letters to Mayor Shurtleiff of Boston, accepting invitations to the Peace Jubilee and the hospitalities of the city tendered to them.

FORRIGN.

The Liverpool Chamber of Commerce held a meeting last week, and voted an address of welcome to Mr. Motley, the new American Minister.

A new paper, called *The Proteger*, is to be started in London, to be sold for a penny. It is to be anti-Romantic, anti-Ritualist, and anti-Rationalist.

It is said that Ismail Pasha's tour, which will extend throughout Europe, is for the purpose of determining the question whether the Suez Canal is to be considered a subject for the neutrality of all nations and for all time.

In the House of Commons, on the 31st ult., Mr. Gladstone moved the third reading of the bill for the disestablishment of the Irish Church. A large number of petitions against the passage of the bill were then presented, after which Mr. James Madden Holt, member for Northeast Lancashire, made, and Lord Ekele, member for Huddlingstone, seconded a resolution that the bill be rejected. A long but interesting debate followed, terminating in a refusal of the House to accept Mr. Holt's proposition, and the passage of the bill, by a vote of 361 against 247. The result was received with uproarious cheers from the ministerial benches. The House shortly afterward adjourned.

The Cortes is now debating the clause in the Constitution which refers to the colonies. Señor Castellar, alluding to Cuba, said if Spain had followed the examples of England in her treatment of the colonies now claim for themselves, the outbreak in Cuba would have been prevented. Marshal Serrano replied that Captain General Dules granted the required liberties when he entered upon the government of Cuba, but party spirit blinded some of the inhabitants to the intentions of the home government. By the demonstration of physical force rebellion had been suppressed; but the moral disorder was disappearing very slowly. When the normal State of the island is restored the home government, acting in conjunction with the deputies of Cuba, will suppress slavery and punish all persons engaged in the slave trade.

POLITICAL.

Both branches of the Ohio Legislature have rejected the Fifteenth Amendment.

The Democratic State Convention of Ohio is to be held in Columbus, on Wednesday, July 7th, for the purpose of nominating State officers.

The temperance men of the State of Maine are to hold a convention in Portland on the 29th of June.

The Republicans of Ohio will nominate candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Judge of the Supreme Court, and Attorney General at Columbus, on Wednesday, June 23.

GENERAL NEWS.

Five young women have just been admitted into the Louisiana Agricultural College at Vinton.

The Oregon Enterprise says that that State now has 60,000 inhabitants.

German immigration is said to be on the decrease in Brazil, on account of religious intolerance there.

Since the first day of January last, 81,000 immigrants have landed at New York from abroad. The number of arrivals since May 1, is 27,837.

Twenty-five tons of raspberries were brought into San Francisco in April and retailed from 15 to 18 cents a pound. Cherries sold for a dollar and a half per pound.

The State Temperance Convention will meet in Boston on the 29th inst.

The question of separating the Siamese twins will soon decide itself, as Chang is in falling health, while Eng is robust.

The Wyoming County Fair will be held at Warsaw, September 14th and 15th.

A farmer in Indiana was plowing in the field on the 29th ultimo with eight teams and as many men, when a thunder storm came up, and a stroke of lightning instantly killed four of the horses and three of the men, and tore their plows to pieces. Two or three others of the men were so stunned that they did not speak for twenty-four hours.

Reports from Lake Sibley state that a party of Sioux and Cheyenne Indians attacked the Scandinavian colony southwest of that place on the 26th inst., killing five of the colony, but they were driven off after hard fighting. Considerable exists on the Republican river; several settlers have been killed within the last few days, and it is stated that two men lately from Sidney, Iowa, were among the number.

The Boston Police on Saturday interrupted an impromptu prize fight, after 22 rounds had been fought, in the back part of a drinking saloon in that city, and arrested Stephen Williams and George March principals, and two others, for aiding and abetting. Both the principals showed severe punishment.

There have been 200 patents issued at the Patent Office, Washington, for velocipedes during the past twelve months.

The Secretary of the Treasury is constantly receiving letters from persons who have lost bonds, by sea, fire or other destructive elements, asking that new ones be issued to take their place. To all such he replies that the department has no authority to do so, and they must seek for relief from Congress.

Orders have been received at the Marshfield (Ch.) for the removal of the iron-clad *Albatross*, which was ready for immediate departure.

The work of constructing a railroad to Oil City will soon commence in earnest and be pushed to a speedy completion.

The New York broker Jerome, for \$20,000 for a lady friend, bought the stocks for a few weeks, and returned her increased to \$20,000.

Female pickpockets are the last and greatest affliction in New York. The stress is mounting, and by their action very nicely.

Gettysburg, Pa., May 31.—All the military organizations of the country are invited to participate in the observance of the dedication of the Soldiers' National Cemetery at Gettysburg, on the 31st of July next, and those intending to be present, are requested to communicate such intentions within a reasonable time; so that proper arrangements may be made for them. The call is signed by David Wells, Chairman.

St. Louis, May 31.—A special dispatch from Fort Leavenworth states that Fossil Creek Station, on the Kansas Pacific Railroad, was attacked by the Indians on Friday night last, and two men were killed and four wounded. The railroad track was torn up and thrown a considerable distance from the grading. A squad of Gen. Custer's regiment, stationed at Fort Hays, had been ordered in pursuit of the Indians. Orders had been sent to the troops quarters in the Indian country to make ready for the emergency.

A company of the 7th Cavalry has been ordered to scout and picket the country around Asher Creek, near the mouth of the Solomon.
