PERSONAL.

Gov. Baker of Massachusetts is in Paris.

Gov. Baker of Indiana is confined to his room by illness.

Ex-Governor Curtis, Minister to Russia, sailed in the Scotia to day.

Mr. C. B. Merriam is the Republican candidate for Mayor of Waterbury, Connecticut.

A new post of the Grand Army of the Republic has been organized in Troy, and named Post Willard.

Longfellow was one of the guests at the recent celebration of the fourth centenary of the birth of Machiavelli in Florence.

The Republicans of Luzerne County instruct their delegates to the Pennsylvania State Convention to favor the nomination of G. V. Gerry.

Mr. John Davis, formerly one of the most popular educators on the Central coast, is in the last stages of consumption, at his residence in Syracuse.

Gen. Geo. H. Thomas, and staff recently arrived in San Francisco, having made the journey from New York in seven days and ten hours.

Jeff. Davis's plantation is now leased to one of his former slaves, who pays \$10,000 a year rent and employs 150 hands to work it.

Wm. H. Seward, his family and several members of the House, accompanied by Mrs. Seward, arrived at Omaha yesterday, on route to San Francisco.

Frank P. Blair, jr., goes to California this week to make arrangements for the establishment of a Western Department of the Life Association of America.

A novelty in Cayuga Lake, which Prof. Agassiz calls the "alewife," has lately been discovered in considerable numbers. They are represented to be about four or five inches in length.

A singular mirage was the other day seen on Lake Ontario. The shore of Canada was visible, buildings on the lake shore loomed up, and vessels appeared sailing like specters.

The Hon. John D. Deeres, late Public Printer, is reported to be about to establish a new Republican newspaper in Indianapolis. He was long the Editor of the Indiana State Journal, and while there he first employed young Schuyler Colfax as a reporter.

The remains of Capt. Henry A. Wise, late Chief of Ordnance of the Navy Department, who died in Naples about two months ago, are to be brought to this country in the steamer Palmyra.

Eleven hundred persons in England pay a tax for keeping in their households more than ten male servants.

There have been three Popes besides Pius IX who have celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their first mass.

An Imperial ukase has been issued authorizing the establishment of the International Bank of Commerce, with a capital of 5,000,000 roubles. The enterprise is promoted by both Russian and foreign bankers, who will take up all the shares.

GENERAL NEWS.

The crop reports in Southern Georgia and Florida are favorable.

Counterfeit Mexican dollars are plentiful in San Francisco.

According to Brigham Young the Federal officers are all scalawags.

The income of Senator Chandler of Michigan for 1868 is reported at \$44,771.

Several parties were poisoned by eating cheese, at Look Haven, Pa., a few days since.

The prospect of a heavy crop of grass throughout the State of Maine is unusually good.

Public Schools are to be opened in White Pine County, N. H., about the middle of July.

The Methodist Church at Manhook, N. Y., voted on Saturday last 93 to 4 in favor of lay Delegation.

The Mayor of Savannah, Ga., says the report of yellow fever there is entirely unfounded.

There are over 250 German papers published in the United States, 52 of them daily.

The annual examination of Cadets at West Point was held during last week. The graduating class numbered 40.

Chicago claims to have the most valuable horse in America, "Ba-haw, Jr.," for which \$35,000 has lately been offered.

A gentleman near San Antonio, Texas, has a ranch of 130,000 acres, fenced in, and 40,000 head of cattle pastured on it.

An adder three and a half feet in length was killed in the yard of the Sherwood House, at Deposit one day last week.

A robin, it is said, kills on an average, eight hundred flies in an hour and a sparrow will destroy at least one hundred and fifty worms and caterpillars in a day.

July 3d has been selected as the day to celebrate the completion of the bridge across the Missouri River, at Kansas City, Mo.

The Union Hotel ball room at Saratoga, N. Y. has been engaged by a committee of Cubans for a fair, to be held the last day in June.

Rust has appeared in the Wheat crop about Richmond, Va., and it is reported that the crop in the vicinity of that city will be reduced one half.

Three daily trains will be run over the Louisville and Cincinnati Air Line Railroad, commencing on Monday, the 21st inst., the day appointed for the opening of business.

On Sunday 13th at West Point Mr. Beecher discouraged the cadets concerning manhood, and gave our young soldiers much excellent advice that may well be heeded far beyond the limits of army circles.

May 25th was the two hundred and sixty-second anniversary of the landing of "ye Captain John" Smith at Jamestown, Va., and the first permanent English settlement in America.

A letter just received here from Chief Justice Chase, gives flattering accounts of the improved condition of South Carolina. He says the people are fast recuperating from the effects of the war, and if permitted, would soon be thriving and prosperous.

A New York firm of powder manufacturers are now loading a schooner for New York with 100,000 pounds of powder purchased by them at a Government sale at Fort Greble, near this city, a short time since. The same firm purchased 80 tons of powder at a recent Government sale at Fort Concorde, which has been previously shipped.

This powder was sold in order that Forts Greble and Corcoran may be dismantled and abandoned, according to an order from the War Department. These forts were important links in the chain of defenses around Washington during the war.

Gen. Grant and family, with Gen. Underwood of Gov. Chittin's staff, arrived in New York on Tuesday, by the Mary Powell, and after spending some time with his friends and prominent gentlemen who called upon him, left by the steamer Providence, at 5 o'clock. The President was accompanied to the wharf by a number of his friends, and as he entered the boat, where he was formally received by Mr. Jay Gould, the band struck up "Hail to the Chief."

The boat was so heavily decorated, as were also a number of other vessels in the vicinity. A few minutes after the President arrived, the Washington Grays, escorted by the Third Regiment of Cavalry, under Major Badke, marched on board. Amid the firing of cannon from the bow of the Providence, and the hurrah of the crowd, the vessel started upon her trip. Mr. James Fisk, and Mr. Simons, agent of the line, accompanied the President's party. The President's family remain in the city.

WASHINGTON, D. C. The Commission of Patents has organized a board for the examination of the qualifications of the clerical forces of the office. The examination comprises history, geography, arithmetic, natural philosophy, astronomy, mechanics, and is very severe. It is thought that a large number of clerks will fail to pass the examination, hence they will be dismissed, and their places supplied by others.

The Secretary of Navy has issued an order to the Commandant of Navy-Yards, forbidding any one being allowed to examine into plans, models, inventions, guns, small arms, or vessels of peculiar construction, without his special permission.

The plan of retrenchment begun by the War Department with the advent of Gen. Ravlin as Secretary is still being pursued. The barracks and army storehouse known as Lincoln Depot, which has been kept up here since the war at a great expense, has been ordered vacated, and the buildings and property therein sold at auction. The order also dispenses with the services of a large number of men who have been employed at the Department.

Gen. Trossel has special and creditable advice that, by means of seven or eight expeditions which have within a few months left New York and Philadelphia, the Cubans have received large and somewhat surprising quantities of arms and munitions of war. On the strength of the recent help given to their cause, or promised them at the late day, the campaign of Gen. Quesada is believed to have assumed a new aspect, in proof of which are the series of successes lately achieved for Cuba at Las Tana, Algrate, Sabana Nigua, the Bay of Nigua, and near Puerto Padre, all of which have gained the Cubans the Cubans have received 21,104 small arms and twenty-two cannon or field pieces. These supplies, received within a period comparatively brief, constitute the most decided and extensive aid the Cubans have ever obtained.

There is reason to believe that the Commission powerfully supported in a new and unexpected quarter, of the character of which it would not be prudent to speak at present. The cause is not likely to fail, we understand, for want of efficient sympathy on the part of the North, and never have the patriots of Cuba received so confident of victory.
