Hon. Henry J. Raymond

In the death of Hon. Henry J. Raymond, Editor of The New York Times, the Press of our City has lost one of its ablest and most eminent members. Mr. Raymond, after graduating with distinction at the University of Vermont, came directly to this city in the autumn of 1840, and was employed on the New-Yorker, for which he had written with force and spirit while a student. The Tribune was started the next April, and Mr. Raymond held the second place on its editorial staff from the outset until the autumn of 1853, when he resigned it to accept a like position on the Courier and Enquirer, which he likewise relinquished after a few years, visiting Europe with his family, and being repeatedly elected to the Assembly of our State, without he was in the second term chosen Speaker. He now started the Times, of which he was from the first sole Editor, though well served by assistants. He was chosen Lieut. Governor of our State in 1854 and elected to Congress from our 17th District in 1854. Mr. Johnson in 1867 nominated him for Minister to Austria, but the Senate did not confirm the selection.

Mr. Raymond's official career, though evincing ability, had less than justice to his comprehensive knowledge and rare intellectual powers. Never so positive and downright in his convictions as his countrymen are apt to be, he was often misjudged as a trimmer and time-server, when in fact he spoke and wrote exactly as he felt and thought. If what he uttered to-day was not in full accordance with what he said yesterday, the difference evinced in his essay was a true reflection of one which preceded it in his mind. He saw both sides of a controverted issue, and if one of them seemed the juster to-day, the other might nevertheless command his preference to-morrow. This mental constitution or mental habit was rare with us, and he would have been more favorably judged as a journalist or politician in Great Britain than in this country.

Mr. Raymond would have ranked in England as a "Liberal-Conservative," and would have followed the flag now of Gladstone, then of Lord Stanley, occasionally siding with Robert Lowe, and again with Bessford Hope. He was sincerely favorable to Liberty, Reform, and Progress; he was no less sincerely averse to rash or violent changes, and anxious that Progress should be regular and equable, never allowing a prejudice nor fluttering a timorous breast. It is perhaps unfortunate, but none the less true, that great wrongs and strongly fortified abuses are not thus to be overcome.

There were probably others who evinced greater ability in some special department; but regarding journalism in its broadest aspect, we doubt whether this country has known a journalist superior to Henry J. Raymond. He was an admirable reporter, a discerning critic, a skillful selector and compiler of news, as well as an able and ready writer. There was nothing in the whole range of newspaper work that he could not do well, and (what is of equal importance) with unhesitating promptness. He was never too sick to work when work had to be done, and always able and willing to do any amount of labor that the exigency might require. Others may have craved a rarer faculty, which some might term genius; but Mr. Raymond embodied talents that have rarely been surpassed.

Genial, unassuming, and thoroughly informed by study, observation, and travel, Mr. Raymond was a delightful companion, and his society was widely courted and enjoyed. A thoroughly capable and effective converser, he has the years' stunted public speaking wherever it should be avoided, finding enough to do without it, and having no decided bias for the sound of his own voice. Struck away so suddenly in the prime of life, and in the midst of its activities, his death makes a void that will not easily be filled, while his loss and children are called to mourn a loss at once astounding and irreparable.

Corn is in tassel in Georgia.

Grasshoppers are at work in Iowa.

Wyoming County complains of wire worms.

Potatoes sell at Hebron, Washington county, for ten cents per bushel.

California counts on picking 1,000 tons of strawberries this season.

Fifty-six million dollars are invested in beer manufacture in this country.

Peach trees in Kentucky are breaking with the weight of the young fruit.

The Banking house of John F. Daily & Co., in St. Louis has been suspended.

One of the camels in the New York Central park is harnessed and compelled to draw a path-roller.

A New Daily Evening paper is to be started in Buffalo, to be called the Herald, published by Townley, Penton, & Co., to be sold at two cents a copy.

A sturgeon weighing forty-eight pounds was caught with a seine in Cayuga lake, at Sheldrake, on the 1st, besides nearly five hundred pounds of other fish.

Indianapolis papers say that iron can be made cheaper there than in Pennsylvania and Brazil. Coal smelts with Laffie Superior or Missouri ore without cooking.

The Chicago, Cincinnati and Louisville railroad, extending to Peru, Ind., has been completed. The road opens a new route between Chicago, Indianapolis and the South.

The new marriage law of Ohio prohibits the intermarriage of first cousins and of girls under sixteen and of boys under twenty-one, unless with the consent of their parents.

A New York and Philadelphia there were on the 5th inst., about sixty vessels loading with Petroleum for Europe, which were to take out about 100,000 barrels of refined.

An exchange says persons who use kerosene lamps will be glad to learn that if the wicks are soaked in strong vinegar for twenty-four hours and thoroughly dried before being used, all smoke will be avoided, the wicks will last twice as long and increased brilliancy will be obtained.

About four weeks ago a desperate character living at Port Chester, West Chester county, named Doddridge Daniels, beat his wife in such a manner that she had to be taken to the almshouse for treatment. She lingered along for two weeks, and then died. The brute has been arrested, and confined in jail to await his trial.

The Port Huron and Lake Michigan Railroad Company, have succeeded in borrowing one million eight hundred thousand dollars of the "Union Trust Company of New York," for the completion of the road from Port Huron to Lansing, and have given a mortgage for the amount, which was recorded in the Register's office here in Coram.

The latest election returns make the new Chamber stand: Government members 199, opposition 99.

Earl Russell's eloquent plea for Disestablishment has proved the best feature of the debate in the house of Lords.

All the preparations necessary for laying the French cable are completed, and the work will be commenced immediately.

On the 1st of June snow was still visible in a ravine at Bolton, Canada; where it drifted last winter to a depth of forty feet.

Princes Arthur has decided to make a visit to Canada, and perhaps to the United States. He will leave England sometime during the fall.

A house in Chicago has ordered an invoice of 50,000 Chinese laborers from California, intending to set them at work on southern plantations.

The frontier difficulties between Turkey and Persia have been settled, and the Persian Ambassador in Constantinople has resumed his functions.

Advices from China to May 27th, states that the Chinese Government had apologized for the insult to Commodore Rochouart, the French Secretary of Legation.

A very formidable collision occurred on the 16th inst. at St. Eliens among the coal miners on the one hand and the National troops on the other, whereby several lives were lost. All quiet now.

Chief Justice Chase arrived at Richmond last Tuesday night from Raleigh, N. C., on his way to Washington.

Henry J. Raymond's son is to be the future editor of the Times. He is a young man of promise and a born journalist.

Mr. Senator Casserly has been making an elaborate speech in San Francisco against allowing Chinese to work in this country.

A woman named Susan Douglass was burned to death at Williamsport, Pa., last Monday. She was starting a fire with the aid of kerosene.

The Jury in the case of F. W. Patterson against the Rochester Union for alleged libel have returned a verdict of no cause of action.

Col. Houghton, Special Agent of the Revenue Department, was assaulted last week, in Cincinnati, by three enraged tobaccoists, whose factories he had seized.

John Allen, of "wickedest man" fame, has abandoned the dance house business and gone into the grocery trade in Chambers, Roosevelt and Baretta streets, New York.

General Peter Washburn, Hon. Julius Converse and Dudley C. Dennison of Windsor County, are spoken of as Candidates for Governor of Vermont by the Republicans.

Prof. H. Dussane, an eminent chemist, and editor of The Industrial Chemist, published in New York and Boston, died suddenly at his residence in New Lehigh, N. Y., Sunday night.

At the trial of a divorce case in Chicago recently, the wife testified that their daughter's name was "Eliza Mercy Jane Laura Delore Ellen De Lore Brown." No wonder a divorce followed.

FOREIGN.
