THE CURRANT WORM.—At the Hor THE CURRAT WORK—At the Horticulural exhibition on Wednesday, several goulemen stated that the current worm would not distarb the bushes under which coal ashes were liberally aprinkled. In coarfermation of this a correspondent of the Express says: "That to prevent the currant slug on currant bushes persons have only to mulch thoroughly all the ground under the bashes with authracite coal ashes. This should be done late in the autumn or early in the apring of the year, before the bushes

should be done late in the autumn or early in the spring of the year, before the hushes leave out, as the worm that feeds on the leaves effer its growth drops off and goes into the earth immediately under the bushes. The grub, when it comes up to change into a fly, cannot make its way through the coarse, sharp grity ash head, and perishes there. Thus far ny bushes are unmoisted by fly or slugs this year, while last year they were almost entirely attipped of the leaves by sings. An easy and chesp vemedy sure by—Rochester Denocrat.
