AGRICULTURAL ITEMS. All kinds of grain in Steuben Co. are reported favorable.

Leo county, Ga., has corn in the stalk. All crops are reported fine in Essex county.

Hops are promising a large crop in Madison Co.

In Genesee Co. all kinds of crops are looking well.

In Livingston Co. the worms have destroyed much of the spring grain—Grass is good.

The crop prospects in Louisiana and Texas are exceedingly good, especially Louisiana sugar.

Grain in Suffolk Co. is reported as looking well, except corn, which is reported backward.

In Monroe Co. the winter wheat is somewhat injured by the cold spring and water on the surface.

California contains 120,947,841 acres of land, of which it is estimated \$5,000,000 can be devoted to profitable husbandry.

An experiment in silk culture in Nevada Co., California, realized from the silk worm egg, produced last season from their mulberry trees three years old, \$308. Expenses for planting and cultivating the trees and feeding the worms \$25, leaving a profit of \$278.

Fruits.—The yield of small fruits is unusually abundant, with a fine promise for those coming in later in the season. Peaches will be abundant in New Jersey and Delaware. There will be a fair crop in the west, and a short supply only in some localities in the southern States, where untimely frosts prevailed.

The fruit and vegetable crops in Delaware will largely exceed the estimates made at the beginning of the season. The yield of strawberries, it is said, will be over 2,000,000 quarts, or 83,500 bushels. The other small fruits, as well as vegetables, are unusually abundant, and the peach crop will be large.
