Railway Items. Thomas Hollan, an engineer, has fallen heir to \$2000,000 in England. The Cleveland (Ohio) papers announce that parties of Engineers, under the direction of the New York and Erie Railway, are engaged in surveying a broad gauge line from Seville, Medina County, on the Atlantic and Great Western Road to Toledo, in the Northwest portion of Ohio.

Description of the new offices of the Erie Railway are flowery indeed. Cupids and rosy nymphs appear in fresco, elegant chandeliers hang from the ceiling, \$500 office chairs supply repose, walnut and gilt desk conveniences, lofty \$600 folding doors allow privacy and \$1,000 washstands abatement. A Pompeian richness, a maze of magnificence, surround everything. Jim Fisk's private office is only equaled in its gorgeous appointments by J. Gould's, and both are unique. A restaurant is one of the appurtenances, and the whole building, which was a theatre, is now a palace.

There is a nice row over the Albany & Susquehanna Railway. President Ramsay and Jas. Fisk, Jr. are contending for the control of the road. The former procured the appointment by Judge Peckham, of R. H. Pruyn as receiver of the road, and Supt. Van Valkenburgh was put in charge of it. The latter procured for himself a similar appointment, from Judge Geo. G.

Barnard, and has appointed Supt. H. D. V. Pratt, of Elmira as superintendent of the road. Last Saturday Mr. Fisk presented himself at the superintendent's office at Albany and demanded admission. He was repulsed; whereupon he produced papers showing that he had been appointed receiver of the road by Judge Barnard, of New York, and calling on several men he had with him, declared his intention of forcibly taking possession. Superintendent Van Valkenburgh appeared and informed Mr. Fisk that Hon. R. H. Pruyn had been appointed receiver, and that he (Mr. Van Valkenburgh) had been put in charge of the office, and ordered him (Mr. Fisk) and his party out. A noise ensued, which resulted in Mr. Fisk and his party being ejected. Still Fisk remained outside making a noisy demonstration, when the superintendent put him in charge of an officer to take to the station house. Mr. Fisk accompanied the officer, but on showing his papers and no one appearing against him, he was discharged. Injunctions and counter injunctions have been issued and no man knoweth which is ahead in the fight so far. At last accounts the Ramsey party were in possession of the Albany end of the road, and the Erie folks as strongly entrenched at the Binghamton end, where Supt. Pratt had switched all the rolling stock he could find on the Erie track.—Valley Times.

THE A & G. W. RAILROAD.—The following is from the Randolph Register: For some time past there has been a good deal of complaint that matters between the A & G. W. railway, and citizens in this vicinity were not properly settled and paid by the company, and during the past year quite a large number of judgements as obtained in this and Chautauque counties against the company Executions issued thereon were returned unsatisfied. On the 17th day of May last Alex. Wentworth, of this place, who, as attorney for creditors, had obtained judgements against the company, applied to the Supreme Court, at a special term thereof at Myrtleville, for sequestration and sale of the property of the company, the appointment of a receiver, and division of the proceeds, etc., under the provisions of the Revised Statutes.

After holding the case under advisement for upwards of two months, the court granted the prayer of the petition, made a decree of sequestration of the property, and appointed Addison G. Rice, of New York, as receiver, to take possession of and sell the property of the company and divide the proceeds among the creditors. On Monday, the 26th inst., Mr. Rice complied with the conditions of the order appointing him, by giving bail in the sum of \$100,000, and is about to enforce the decree unless payment of these judgements is made.

The strife between Mr. Gould, who is already receiver of the railway under a foreclosure proceedings, and Mr. Rice who represents execution creditors, may be a bitter one, but it is the determination of those concerned to push the decree through at any cost, unless these just debts are paid.

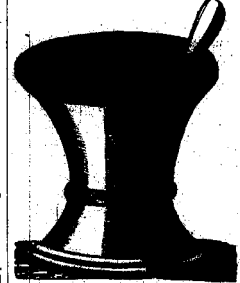
