Heavy Rain Throughout the Country. An Immense Damage Done.

RAIL-ROAD COMMUNICATION BROKEN.

One of the heaviest rains known in this country in many years, occurred on Sunday night last. It seemed to have extended through the Eastern States, but much harder in this State than elsewhere.

Reports from Dutchess county state that in all parts of it some of the bridges have been torn away, and travel everywhere throughout the county is impeded for a distance of fifty miles north.

Several bridges are gone on the Rutland & Washington Railroad. Two hundred and fifty feet of the low path has been carried away between Montpelier and Waterford.

The Erie canal is in a very bad condition. There are two breaks on the four mile level, five miles west of this city.
