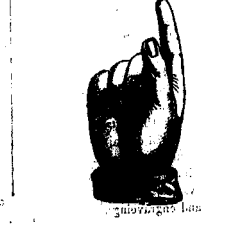

Presbyterian Union

The reunion of the Presbyterian Church, which has been under negotiation since 1866, has at last been substantially accomplished. It will be remembered that in 1866, the General Assembly of the Free School and Church Union in New York, and agreed upon a plan of union which, as submitted to the Presbyteries, was more than two-thirds of them formally ratified. The following year, the General Assembly met at Albany, and the details of the union which will finally take place in May. The Presbyterian Church, thus reunited will embrace 458 Presbyteries, 655 churches, 6,068 ministers, and 654,000 communicants. It is estimated that the congregations number 4,000,000 souls, thus placing the church in third rank among the Protestant denominations in size. The Methodist is the most numerous, the Baptists next, and after the Presbyterians the Congregationalists, Lutherans, Episcopalians, Reformed Dutch, and Unitarians.

About Marriage.
