We, with pleasure place at the head of our columns, the name of Horace B. Smith, of Chemung, for member of Congress from the 27th district of New York. Mr. Smith is a man in whom the Republicans will find everything necessary to make a good honest representative.

At a meeting of Republican Delegates from the 27th Congressional District, held at the Osborne House in the village of Hornellville, Sept. 29, 1870, R. E. Colwell, of Allegany, was chosen Chairman, and Samuel Mitchell of Steuben, Secretary.

Credentials were presented as follows: Allegany—Alva E. Crutenden, Walter Crandall, Washington Moses, Rufus L. Colwell, Anson C. Hall, Orrin T. Stacy.

Chemung—John T. Rathbun, Eaton M. Fabbie, M. C. Beaucett, Peter Winterborne.

Steuben—1st District—Jonathan Robb, S. E. Haskin, Wm. D. Boyd, Owen Kiley.

2nd District—Henry Sherwood, W. S. Hodgman, Alvan A. Van Arsdale, F. D. Sherwood, Samuel Mitchell.

On all of the roll of all the delegates were found to be present and answered to their names, the Hon. S. T. Hays having been substituted in place of W. S. Hodgman.

Mr. Hays moved the unanimous nomination of Horace B. Smith, of Chemung, for Representative in Congress, stating that he had been instructed to do so by the delegation from Steuben. The motion was adopted by acclamation.

On motion the following gentlemen were appointed a Congressional Committee: Eaton F. Fiske, of Chemung, Chairman; Lloyd McDougl, of Chemung; William Van Nostrand, and Wm. H. Witby, of Allegany; Wilcox E. Busham, John W. Shieley and O. J. Arvill, of Steuben.

Then Peter Winterborne, of Chemung, offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: Resolved, As the sense of this Convention, that we heartily endorse and approve the congressional course of the Hon. Hamilton Ward.

Convention. He remarked, that he scarcely knew whether he was better pleased with his nomination, or the complimentary manner in which he had been introduced to the Convention. On motion of Mr. Scott, the delegates were instructed to cast their votes for H. Boardman Smith of Steuben, as candidate for Member of Congress from the 27th District.

The Convention then proceeded to vote for Sheriff. The first ballot was as follows: Joseph Gillis 55, W. H. King 24, E. P. Crandall 3, H. P. Bart 8, A. Post 3, Bart 3.

2d Ballot—Gillis 37, W. H. King 35, E. P. Crandall 1, H. B. Bart 10, A. Post 3. 3d Ballot—Gillis 33, King 43, Bart 7, E. P. Crandall 3. 4th Ballot—King 43, Gillis 43. 5th Ballot—Gillis 45, King 41. On motion Mr. Joseph Gillis was declared unanimously nominated.

On motion of Mr. Scott the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the majority of the Congressional delegates, elected at this Convention, have power to substitute for any member of the delegation, who is unable to attend the Congressional Convention, or who may be absent.

Pursuant to a call of the Town Com. meeting, the Republican electors of the town of Scio met at the house of John Starnes, in said town, on the twenty-fourth day of September, Eighteen Hundred and Seventy, for the purpose of electing three delegates to the County Convention, to be held at Belmont on the twenty-seventh inst.

At this meeting Sidney Smith was elected Chairman, and Samuel McClinton Secretary.

A motion was then carried to ballot for delegates. The result of the ballot was as follows: For the ticket of J. C. Hays 58, Wm. H. King 24, E. P. Crandall 3, H. P. Bart 8, A. Post 3, Bart 3.

It was then moved and carried, that J. C. Hays, Wm. H. King, E. P. Crandall, H. P. Bart, and A. Post be the delegates to the County Convention, to be held at Belmont on the twenty-seventh inst.

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
