THE ELECTION. The election on Tuesday, as far as we are able to learn, passed off quietly. The returns from the State are not very complete but there is no doubt whatever that Gov. Hoffman has been re-elected by about the same majority that he won in 1868.

NEW YORK. The State has probably gone Democratic by 25,000 to 30,000 majority. The latest count of the Assembly makes 66 Republicans and 62 Democrats, with a few districts still in doubt.

NEW JERSEY. The Republicans have redeemed the State by a sweeping victory. Four out of the five Congressmen elected are Republicans, a gain of two. The Legislature is divided in both branches.

MASSACHUSETTS. Returns from 141 towns give Claf. (Rep.) 51,978; Adams, (Dem.) 21,116; Wendell Phillips, (Labor Reform) 11,552. The same towns last year gave Claf. 44,724; Adams 20,228; Chamberlain 7,618.

RHODE ISLAND. This State chose Republicans to Congress in her two districts. James (Conservative) for the Sprague candidate has 156 votes, over his three competitors in the 1st District. In the 2d, Pendleton (Republican) had an easy victory.

ILLINOIS. The contest in Chicago was very exciting. Farwell, Rep., for Congress, leads by about 4,000. The Republicans here carried the State. Ingersoll (Rep.) is elected to Congress from the Fifth District.

MICHIGAN. The Republican majority in this State is estimated at 25,000.

WISCONSIN. Milwaukee city gives Mitchell (Dem.) to Congress, 6,501 majority; in the State he will receive about 3,500 majority. The State has gone Republican by about 6,000 majority.

MINNESOTA. The Republican elect Averill to Congress in the Second District, over Deming, by about 4,000 majority, and Drayton in the First District over Rep. Democrat, by a handsome majority.

MISSOURI. The returns indicate that Brown (Republican) has been elected Governor by a large majority. The Democrats elect their candidate for Mayor in St. Louis.

KENTUCKY. Returns indicate that the Democrats have elected Congressmen in the First and Seventh Districts. The English and Ninth are not yet heard from, but are claimed by the Republicans.

TENNESSEE. The election in this State has resulted in the choice of a Democratic Governor, Legislature and five Democratic Congressmen. Butler in the First and Maynard in the Second District, Republicans are probably elected.

ALABAMA. The Democrats are very jubilant, they confidently claim the State, four Congressmen and a large majority in the lower House.

LOUISIANA. The Republican majority in New Orleans probably is 5,000. The returns from the State are very meagre and no estimate can be given, but it is probable there is a large Rep. majority.

ARKANSAS. The State has gone Republican by a handsome majority.

NEVADA. The Democratic candidate for Governor is elected by a small majority.

PHILADELPHIA and Reading. The Philadelphia and Reading are the only cities in the State that have not yet given their vote.

The Congressional Result.

The New York Tribune, of yesterday says: "We have lost three members of Congress in New York, in the XVII, XVIII, and XXIII Districts; we have probably lost three members in Illinois, in the III, VII, and VIII Districts; one in Wisconsin, one in Michigan, several in Missouri, and perhaps one in Alabama, and have gained one in New Jersey, one in Minnesota, one or two in Kentucky, and three—possibly four—in Louisiana. The Republicans will have from 50 to 60 majority in the new House of Representatives. We deplore losses, but shall affect no regret that, coupled with the evil thus wrought, comes the corresponding benefit of a majority not so large as to breed dissensions or stimulate reckless action."

We announce with pleasure the triumphant election of Walter L. Sessions to Congress from the Chautauque District. His majority is two hundred and sixty-two. This is a great victory for the party in the district and the State. The old wrong has now been righted, and we will look to the future for a renewal of harmony and success in the district.

Advice from Shanghai to October 18th states that four gunboats, mounting ten guns each, have been launched and are being fitted out for service. The Chinese Government is importing enormous quantities of powder and arms, besides several batteries of cannon. Affairs are assuming a serious turn.

If specie payment is any sign of national prosperity, than Germany cannot be in a very bad way. Recently a part of the Bavarian loan was paid at Berlin, and it took an express train to transport the sum, which was in silver coin, and amounted to five and a quarter millions of thalers.
