Our Legislature

It was supposed by many that the organization of the Legislature there would be trouble in the Republican ranks, but in this they were disappointed. The contest on Monday, prior to the caucus, was animated, as it most always is, and a good deal of hard work done in the way of canvassing, but it there was any first feeling ill-disposed after the first ballot in the caucus on Monday evening, on Mr. Henry Smith of Albany, receiving the greatest number of votes, and in thus being we think the caucus acted wisely. At the same time we must admit that Mr. Alvord is an able man and would make a splendid speaker, he having filled many positions with honor to himself. Mr. Smith is one of the ablest lawyers in the State and a man who is respected for his integrity and ability. On Tuesday the Legislature commenced doing business and a number of resolutions, memorials and bills were offered, among them was a memorial asking for the expulsion of Mr. Thomas Fields from his seat in the House. Mr. Brown offered a concurrent resolution, proposing an amendment to the Constitution prohibiting appropriations from the Treasury for the support of sectarian schools. Mr. Hill, (Dem.) offered a bill for the abolition of the contract system in State Prisons. On Wednesday the House passed a resolution to adjourn over to Tuesday morning, in order to give the Speaker time to make up his Committee.

A royal feast in Africa consists of 400 monkeys and 1,000 yams. A bus driver in Kansas has fallen heir unexpectedly to \$2,000,000. The regular monthly sale of Saratoga coal took place last week Wednesday. One hundred and twenty thousand tons were sold, at an average decline on last month's sale of twenty per cent. Aaron A. Sargent was elected United States Senator by the Joint Convention of the California Legislature. The vote was divided according to strict party lines, Sargent receiving 179 votes and Wallace, (Dem.) 47. Sidney Edwards Morse, the Geographer, son of Rev. Jedediah Morse, D. D., and brother of Prof. S. F. B. Morse, died in New York, Saturday morning in the seventy-eighth year of his age. Gen.
