A bill has passed the Legislature which requires the Clerk of the Superior Court to transmit to the Comptroller, annually, a statement of the receipts and disbursements of the office of the Superior Court.

Vaccination. EDITOR ANDOVER ADVERTISER: While the small pox epidemic prevails so extensively, any information relating to protection against its ravages is of interest. Of the following questions have been frequently asked:

1st. Does vaccination afford complete protection against small pox? 2d. Do I need to be vaccinated again? (if having "worked" well once) 3d. Is the American virus as sure a preventative of small pox as that direct from cases of cow pox? 4th. Is there any larger or more efficacious other disease by vaccination?

ANSWER. 1st. Vaccination affords complete protection against small pox (so long as it retains its virulence) as does an attack of the small pox itself. Cases are by no means rare of those who have had small pox (two or three times) and Simpson of Edinburgh cites an instance of a case having had it four times.

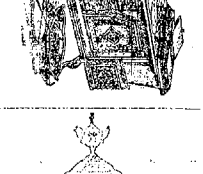
