Samuel J. Parker, State Treasurer of Rhode Island, died at his residence in Newport on Monday the 5th inst. of pneumonia.

A bill has been offered in the House authorizing the succession of real estate to female citizens of the United States and their descendants, notwithstanding their marriage with aliens.

The Kansas House Saturday passed a bill releasing from criminal prosecution witnesses who testify before the Hribery Investigating Committee, and adopted a memorial to Congress asking for the admission of Canadian lumber into the United States free of duty.

Beck, one of Kentucky's ablest Democrats in Congress, recently referred to President Grant's Indian policy, thusly:

"I think if the President is satisfied in his policy and it is carried out, we shall have an improvement in the management of the Indian far exceeding anything we have ever had in this country on that subject from any administration."

The work of putting Forts Sumpter and Moultrie in a defensive condition will begin immediately by the mounting of forty heavy guns. Fort Pulaski, below Savannah, is also to be strengthened with extensive earthworks and guns of greater calibre. Captain Raw, who has been on leave at Charleston, S. C., has been ordered at once to the command of the Steamer Wana of the South Atlantic squadron.

If any wonder why the people are so anxious for the re-nomination of General Grant, they can find one of the main reasons right here: He lies within the past eleven months, made our national indebtedness nearly THREE HUNDRED MILLION DOLLARS LESS. Is not this enough to satisfy the American people that we want four years more of this kind of administration. Democrats and disappointed office seekers, may say what they please, as long as the people can see such exhibits of the financial conditions of our Government they will not believe that a change can better than in any way.

The following extract is taken from one of "Dink" Fumroy's recent letters to his paper:

The United States Commissioner of Education has compiled from the census returns some valuable statistics illustrating the relations of education to crime in the New England States. His statement shows: First, that 80 per cent of the criminals in these States have no education, or not sufficient to serve their available purpose in life; second, 80 to 90 percent of the criminals have never learned any trade; nor are they masters of any skilled labor; third, not far from 75 per cent of the crimes committed are by persons of foreign extraction; fourth, 80 to 90 per cent of the criminals are intemperate; fifth, 95 per cent of the juvenile offenders come from idle, ignorant, vicious and drunken homes.

The respectable dodge of forging a letter of resignation was recently successfully tried in New Orleans, Gov. Warmouth received a letter purporting to come from a Recorder, which the official never sent, resigning his position. A new man was instantly appointed to fill the vacancy. But the accused Recorder, very much amazed at finding himself out of office, declares his resignation is notorious of his resignation. The "Alabama Claims" Treaty.

The New York Standard, in speaking of the course which the press of England is pursuing in regard to the Washington Treaty, says: "The London press appear determined to bring about a war between England and this country; and if they continue at the work of slander, in which they are engaged long enough they will accomplish their purpose. We are not very warlike people; we would rather discuss at peace with our kinsfolk across the water; but we must remind them of the fact that human nature has its limits of endurance, and that if they find us giving blows in exchange for insults, they must not be surprised. We think we have faithfully kept our engagements made at Washington last June, and we do not at all fancy being charged with deceit or perfidy. The American people were not at all anxious to settle what are known as the "Alabama Claims"; the proposals looking toward that end were all made by Great Britain. We were contented to wait, but England was not. She wanted the matter disposed of. We deferred to her wish, and the Treaty of Washington was supposed to have accomplished the object aimed at by her. The Joint High Commissioners of the two Governments agreed to submit the claims to a Board of Arbitrators, to meet at Geneva. Each party to the treaty was to draw up a statement of its case, and the board was to examine each, and render their decision in accordance with certain principles laid down in the treaty itself. Nothing is said in the treaty about including one kind of claims and excluding others. Its language is as clear as can be, as the following shows: "In order to remove and adjust all complaints and claims on the part of the United States, and to provide for the speedy settlement of such claims, which are not admitted by Her Britannic Majesty's Government, the high contracting parties agree that all the said claims shall be referred to a tribunal of arbitrators. This is explicit enough. The complaints and claims of the United States are all to be referred to the board of arbitrators, to be judged by them. Now, our Government has drawn up a schedule of these claims, and has submitted them to the board, England—or at least the press of the English metropolis—is enraged by them. We are taken to task for our "check." Our rulers are charged with an utter disregard of principle, capable of doing anything for party advantage. The British Government is told to withdraw from the treaty, and much other folly of the same sort is urged on the attention of parliament as soon as it meets. The London Times, and the other journals which follow in its footsteps, had better understand what the consequences of such action as they counsel their Government to take will be. Let them remember that we did not seek the treaty; and take notice that we will not, at their wish, now content ourselves with anything less than the fulfillment. If they wish war, the American people will accommodate them, reluctant as they are to engage in such pastimes; and if war breaks out England may bid good-by to Canada forever. Prudence, if not shame at their silliness, should teach these journalists to stop their "bust and cry," and to apologize to us for the slanders they have uttered about us."

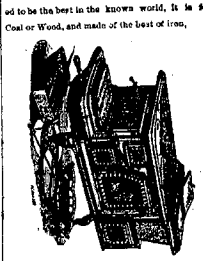

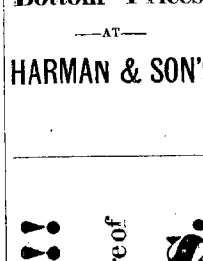

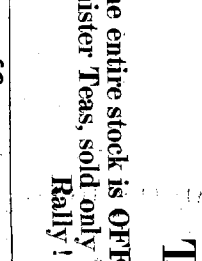
