Terrible Fire at Hunter's Point.
OVER FIFTY THOUSAND BARRELS OF OIL
FOUR SHIPS BURNED!
New York, July 30.—A dispatch from the operator in the Western Union Telegraph office at Hunter's Point, L. I., at 10:45 a. m., says: A fire is raging on the west shore, about twenty rods from the Long Island road depot, and it is spreading fast. A number of boats have been burned, and the oil yard is on fire.

At a secret meeting of the Erie directors on Thursday last, the office of General Superintendent of the road was abolished, and General Diven, the Vice-President, invested with its duties, under the title of Manager. He will hold this position as well as that of Vice President. The salary of the President was reduced from \$25,000 per year to \$20,000. Gen. Diven's salary was fixed at \$15,000 and that of James B. Hildin, the new Treasurer, at \$10,000. It was decided to remove the offices of the company from the Opera House to their former location in West street, and workmen are busily engaged in making necessary repairs, which will occupy but a few weeks.
