EXECUTIVE OF MARLOW.

Charles Marlow was hanged at Mayville, N. Y., on the 24th of August, 1871. We enquire from the Elmira Advertiser an outline of the murder, trial, execution and confession of the criminal.

The crime was one of the most revolting ever committed in Western New York. Beeman, a stranger, of whose antecedents nothing is known, and professed to have a large amount of money in his possession. Two days before Marlow entered him into a vault under his brewery and shot him, and then burned the body of his victim in the brewery furnace.

Marlow received two trials, the jury in the first disbelieving. On the second trial he was convicted, and sentenced to be hanged August 24th. A stay of proceeding was granted and the case taken to the Supreme Court, but a new trial was refused, and to day was designated as the time for the execution.

Throughout his trials Marlow expressed impudence, and during his confinement preserved the same command over himself. He always denied his guilt until last night, when he made full confession, conditional that it should not be made public until after his death.

On the 18th of last month he attempted to kill the jailer and make his escape. Augusta Marlow, his wife, is in the same jail, under indictment for endeavoring to aid in her husband's escape, by furnishing him a dozen wad spring saws in the heels of a pair of slippers.

After dictating his confession last night, he remained peaceful until morning, sleeping a little at intervals. He refused to the last to receive a clergyman, saying they could not send his soul to heaven or hell.

The trap was arranged in the corner of the jail. Marlow was brought out at five minutes past twelve. He sat down on the platform while Sheriff Harrington read his death warrant. He then took his place on the trap without an tremor of the muscles, and in a low but distinct voice said he was not directly guilty of the crime for which he was to suffer. He further stated that he had made a full statement of all his knowledge of the murder in his written confession. He asked pardon of the sheriff and his officers for the trouble he had caused them.

At seventeen minutes past twelve Sheriff Harrington sprung the trap. The fall was seven feet, dislocating his neck and crushing death without a struggle. The execution was conducted in the most perfect and law-abiding manner.

Marlow's confession is in effect, that he administered strychnine to Beeman, on some beer, and when it commenced operating on him he struck him on the head with a hammer in the right hand, and then burned the body in the brewery furnace.

A Rousing Rally for Grant!

The Republicans of Wellsville held a large ratification meeting on Tuesday night. The meeting was addressed by Gen. Hite, of Elmira.
