A Year Without a Summer.

The present is claimed by some to be the hottest summer on record. Let us turn from this to a year without a summer. A correspondent of the Boston Globe, who has been delving among the records of the past, writes: "While every one is speaking of the present season as being remarkable in its characteristics, I have gathered for your readers some reliable facts of the 1816, known as the 'year without a summer.' Few persons now living can recollect it, but it was the coldest ever known through Europe and America. The following is a brief abstract of the weather during each month of the year. January was mild, so much so as to render fires almost needless in parlors. December previous was very cold. February was not very cold, with exception of a few days it was mild, like its predecessor. March was cold and boisterous during the first part of it; the remainder was mild. A great freshet on the Ohio and Kentucky rivers caused great loss of property. April began warm, but grew colder as the month advanced, and ended with snow and ice and a temperature more like winter than spring. May was more remarkable for frosts than smiles. Bulls and fruits were frozen; corn killed, and the fields again and again replanted until deemed too late. June was the coldest ever known in this latitude. Frost, ice, and snow were common. Almost every green thing was killed. Fruit nearly all destroyed. Snow fell to the depth of ten inches in Vermont, several in Maine, three in the interior of New York, and also in Massachusetts. Considerable damage was done at New Orleans in consequence of the rapid rise of the river. The suburbs were covered with water, and the roads were only passable with boats. July was accompanied by frost and ice. On the 6th ice was formed of the thickness of a common window glass throughout New England, New York, and some parts of Pennsylvania. Indian corn was nearly all destroyed; some favorably situated fields escaped. This was true of some of the hills farms of Massachusetts. August was more cheerless, if possible, than the summer months already passed. Ice was formed half an inch thick. Indian corn was so frozen that the green part was cut down and dried for fodder. Almost every green thing was destroyed both in this country and Europe. Papers received from England state 'that it would be remembered by the present generation that the year 1816 was a year in which there was no summer.' Very little corn ripened in the New England and Middle States. Farmers supplied themselves from the corn produced in 1815 for the seed of the ensuing 1817. It was cut from four to five dollars per bushel. September furnished about two weeks of the mildest weather of the season. Soon after the middle it became very cold and frosty; ice formed a quarter of an inch thick. October produced more than its share of cold weather, frost and ice in common. November was cold and mustering. Snow fell as to make good sleighing. December was to mild and comfortable. The above is a summary of 'the cold summer of 1816,' as it was called, in order to distinguish it from the cold season. The winter was mild. Frost and ice were common in every month of the year.

GREELY'S PROMISES.

His Reply to the Southern Democrats Who Wish to Ascertain Who Would Control.

The following is the letter of Gen. J. B. Gordon, of Georgia, giving the result of his interview with Mr. Greeley in relation to the "consulars" by whom he would surround himself in case he were elected President.

ATLANTA, Aug. 23, 1872.
Col. Charles E. McGreggor, Editor
Harrison's Clippings.

DEAR COLONEL:—Years of the 12th, just reached this city during my absence. Hence the delay in answering it. Your inquiry as to whether the Democratic party can expect any recognition from Horace Greeley, its life-long enemy, in case of his election, is a most natural and important one, and one which has given me much concern. You accompany this inquiry with two remarks:

The Albany (Ga.) Central City publishes the foregoing and says: "As Mr. Greeley now publicly pledges himself to give the Democratic party an equal showing in his Cabinet, and promises all that we could now reasonably expect, we shall withdraw our opposition."

First, that you had heard it claimed that in a conversation with Mr. Greeley had intimated that if elected he would recognize in his appointments the claims of the Democratic party upon him.

Secondly, that "believing that the contest is now as to who shall control the Presidency," you are under the conviction that if it is made public in those terms, or at least an equal showing with the Republicans, it would enable all "Straightouts" to cease opposition and rally to his support."

I consider the unity of Democrats in Georgia in such overhauling consequences now that I give you, as requested, the substance of Mr. Greeley's remarks, with the hope that the good results you anticipate may to some extent be realized.

In connection with several prominent Southern gentlemen I met Mr. Greeley, at the request of Democratic friends, and stated to him the fact that it was of great moment to Democrats, and especially to the Southern people, to know what class of consulars he would have about him if elected. His reply was in effect this: "I am given credit for having some common sense. I should not consider myself entitled to this credit if I should turn my back upon a majority of the men who had elected me." I can say with no objection to making this public, as he has himself in a recent speech given publicity to the same idea. I confess this conversation had some effect in allaying my opposition to Mr. Greeley, and in connection with other considerations, which I shall have the honor of alluding to, to your people in the first Tuesday in September, have decided me to give him my support.
