Accident on the Wilmington and Welden Railway.

Wilmington, N. C., Sept. 27.—Three cars of the down Express train on the Wilmington and Welden railway on the track between Drexelville and Dudley last night. The locomotive and the first car were wrecked down upon an embankment, the latter turning upside down. A considerable number of passengers were slightly, and two or three severely, but none dangerously injured.
