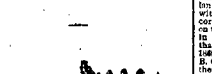

## IMPORTANT FIGURES.

The State Deficiency and How It Came—Democratic vs. Republican Administration.

From the Albany Evening Journal.

The fact has already been widely published that there is a deficiency of \$8,600,000 on our State finances, which will be met by direct taxation, and which has a third of the entire State tax levied this year. How this deficiency occurred and how it is to be met are questions of vital interest to the people. As there has been some discussion and some attempts at misrepresentation on the subject, we have asked Comptroller Hopkins for full official statements, and by his friend Mr. Henry Gallien, the experienced Deputy Comptroller, has prepared the tables which we publish below.

Of the total deficiency about \$2,600,000 belong to the Canal Fund—that is, grew out of the Democratic error and profligacy in the management of the Canals. The remaining \$6,000,000 are in the General Fund—that is, grew out of the excess of general expenditures in the State administration beyond the receipts. The appended tables show the expenditures and receipts on account of the General Fund for the past three fiscal years. It is stripped of all technicalities, and simply exhibits in plain figures the actual income from taxes and other sources of revenue, and the actual outlay. The tables commonly embodied in the Comptroller's report are often blind to the general reader, because complicated and loaded down with legal formalities. But this table is directed at all formalities, and is one of the clearest and most intelligible ever emanated from the Comptroller's office. It presents the actual expenditures and receipts for each fiscal year, on account of the General Fund, in a clear and concise manner.

## FOR CONGRESS.

Hon. Boardman Smith has stood the test and come out sound and unharmed. No suggestion of unpopularity attaches to his congressional career. He took his place in Washington and commanded the respect of his associates, and acquired an influence unusual in a new member. His fidelity to the party which elected him has never been questioned. He is a good man to re-elect. His opponent has no claim upon Republicans. Mr. Hart remained in the Republican party till he thought he saw a chance to be elected to congress on an opposition ticket. He was not an original Democratic man. He cannot claim to be a reformer in any sense or in any degree. He was at the Republican State Convention, at Elmira, and was then counting himself with the regular organization. He jumped into the opposition car at the last moment; and when the train rolled over Greeley's nomination by the Democracy he dived from it, as it did many others. He thought the tide was surely rising which would carry the Greeley party safely into harbor. So believing, he threw his baggage aboard. There is nothing in all this to entitle him to the votes of Republicans. While he was in our party he was well taken care of. He held as many offices and reaped quite as much of honor and credit as his services called for. If the Democrats want to pick up what kind

of Republican doctrine and give them their votes, all right. Things have changed. The coalition which broke down in the States which have held their elections the Republican doctrine have run behind the straight Democratic nomination. So it will be in this district. Hart will not get as many votes as a consistent Democrat would have. Political treachery generally falls of its own price.—Hornellsville Times.

## New York Must Be Saved.

It is not enough that the Union is saved and that strong, brave, loyal men have control of our ship of state for the next year, but the Empire State must be saved from the incalculable disaster to all our best interests which we are assured would follow the success of the Keran-Depew coalition. The political record of both these men is such as should disqualify them for holding the office for which they seek the votes of the people. The Condition of the National Debt of the United States—Forthright Reduction, Oct. 1, \$10,326,000.

The undersigned, merchants, bankers, and business men of New York, respectfully submit the following statement for the information of all parties interested therein:

The Republican candidate for President of the United States is General Ulysses S. Grant, who was unanimously named for re-election at Philadelphia, in May last.

As the commencement of General Grant's first term of office, March 4, 1869, the National Debt was \$2,325,000,000. On the 1st day of September of the present year, there had been paid and canceled of the principal of this debt, \$348,000,000, leaving a balance of principal remaining unpaid at that date, in accordance with the official statement of the Secretary of the Treasury, the sum of \$2,177,000,000.

Of this amount \$1,777,000,000 are represented in a funded debt, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent, and \$400,000,000 remain unfunded in Treasury circulation.

At the close of the last session of Congress, the annual reduction of taxes, as authorized by the act of 1869, had been followed by \$32,000,000 of internal revenue tax (repaid), \$20,000,000 of duties on imports, \$18,000,000 of
