THE SALARY OF OUR COUNTY JUDGE

The question of the salary of County Judge and Surrogate, we find, is being discussed thoroughly by the people of this county. The complaint is that the salary, as fixed two years ago by the Legislature, is too high. Let us consider it. During the war, and up to the time of the election of Judge Green, Judge Hester, done this whole business of the office combined, which was then many times what it is now, for \$1,200. Two years, if our memory serves us right, the Board of Supervisors, with considerable reluctance, voted him \$250 extra, in order that he might do his duty in the office, and at \$1,500 it was deemed exorbitant and was not paid; but now Judge Green, for less work, receives more than twice as much, and we think the people have just cause to complain and to demand a reduction.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Our present Legislature will have to vote upon the new amendments to the constitution, as it is required that the Legislature must take them up and then the people may ratify them before they can become a law, as they were approved by the Legislature last year. Therefore this body must adopt them as they were last year, or they go down. One of the amendments to be taken up is that which prohibits the Legislature, in an extra session, from considering any other objects than such as the Governor may recommend for consideration. This we believe is truly a valuable one and should be adopted. There is another which restricts special legislation. This we need and should have, and it is a pity that the present Legislature is not restricted by this amendment. But here is one which we are opposed to, and strongly. It is article V, in the amendment which confers extraordinary powers upon the Governor. It should never have been presented, especially in the present Legislature, in view of the Secretary of State, Attorney General, State Engineer and Surveyor, Superintendent of State Prisons, and a Superintendent of Public Works, should be appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.
