Any inhabitant liable to highway tax who shall transport by the side of the public highway any forest trees of suitable size, will be liable by the overseers of highways in absence of his highway tax, one dollar for every four trees set out. But no more of them shall be placed nearer than fifty feet to row of maples which may be set thirty feet apart. That trees set out also be set at least fifty feet apart, and no allowance, as before mentioned, shall be made, unless the same shall have been used on the same place to the extent of one acre and well protected from animals at the risk of the owner. A. Johnson shall take effect immediately.
