The ten or twelve remaining are of two classes—one devoted. to consultation and reference, the other to general circulation, and this latter class is again divided into free and subscription libraries. Of the 1,400,000 books in the public libraries of the city, only about 100,000 are accessible to any and every one. These figures do not compare favorably with those furnished by other cities. Boston has a free publiq library containing 434,000 volumes. Cin kiunati has one containing 145,000 vol thmes. Chicago has one containing nearl 100,000 volumes, while many other smaller cities are in advance of New York in proportion to their size and popular tion.—Frank Leslie's.
