Kansas Senator Stricken With Apoplexy.

ALMED SHORTLY AFTER.

Action Now Severely Blamed by Many of His Colleagues.

Senator Plumb said that Senator might be in a trance, as had had Cataleptic Fits Before.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—At 10 o'clock this morning the body of Senator Plumb, who died of apoplexy shortly before noon, was taken from his apartments, under escort from the Capitol police, to the Marble Room of the Senate.

Shortly before 2 o'clock the body will be moved to the Senate Chamber, where the funeral services will be conducted by Rev. J. G. Butler, Chaplain of the Senate.

At 2:30 the body will be taken to the Baltimore & Potomac Railroad depot, accompanied by the national committee, the President, the Cabinet, the Chief Justice and Justices of the Supreme Court, members of the House, members of the Diplomatic Corps, and the friends of the late Senator.

The car in which the remains will be conveyed will be attached to the "Lumber Express" which leaves Washington at 3:30 and will reach Emporium on the evening of the 23d, where interment will take place at 2 o'clock on the 24th.

Plumb had been ailing more or less since the close of his herculean last campaign in this State. He had not, or would not attempt to burn or blow it up.

Several colleagues of Senator Plumb are playing havoc with the front rank of Baltimore's citizens. Again the already large list is swelled by the deaths of Francis T. King and Charles L. Carson.

Mrs. Muzard's Career Recalled by Her Brother's Death.

MISTRESS OF HOLLAND'S KING.

How William Henry Blakeney, Now Dead at Nyack, Dissipated the Royal Gifts.

His Sister, Afterward Mrs. Muzard, Considered the Handsomest Woman in America—How She Came to the Court of Holland—Blakeney's Recklessness and Wild Doings—He Leaves a Wealthy Sister in Brooklyn.

NYACK, N. Y., Dec. 21.—William Henry Blakeney, son of William Blakeney and brother of the famous Mrs. Muzard, the beautiful mistress of the late William IV, King of Holland, is dead at the family homestead at Odgensburg, aged about fifty-four years.

THE LATEST CHILI RUMOR.

Secretary Blaine Will Say Nothing About It—Denial by a Legation Attache.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—It is impossible to-day to get either a confirmation or a contradiction of the published statement that the State Department has received a cablegram from Minister Egan to the effect that the American Legation at Santiago is surrounded by a Chilean mob who threaten to burn it down or blow it up in order to capture the Chilean refugees who are under the protection of the Legation.

Senator Montt, the Chilean Minister, is not at home, and the Secretary of the Legation receives callers. He states that the Minister has not received any late dispatches from his government, but feels sure if there had been an uprising against the American Legation at Santiago, the Minister at Washington would have been advised of it.

Charged With Stealing \$42,000. BOSTON, Dec. 19.—Joseph W. Hamilton, 32 years of age, is held for trial here on a warrant charging him with unlawfully using and diverting to his own use money of the secretary of the Royal Ark, one of the endowment orders, to the amount of \$42,000.

Excitement Over the Downfall of the Ministry. WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Some of Mr. Mills' friends still think that he will be appointed to the chairmanship of the Committee on Ways and Means by Speaker Crisp, notwithstanding the publication of this correspondence on the subject.

MY DEAR SIR:—Having been too much engaged to call upon you, and being soon about to enter upon the work of constituting the House committees, I drop you a line to know if it would be agreeable or acceptable to you to be appointed second on the Committee of Ways Means, and, in addition to such assignment, to be appointed Chairman of the Committee on Commerce, or Chairman of the Committee on Post-offices and Post Roads, or Chairman of some Committee whose work is less laborious than Chairman on Postoffices.

Notwithstanding this refusal of Mr. Mills to serve on the Committee on Ways and Means, it is said that Speaker Crisp will appoint him chairman of the other committee, as proposed. Either that on Postoffices and Post Roads, or Commerce, or Merchant Marine and Fisheries.
