THE FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

[Continued from First page.]

If you want increased products and prices. Mr. Smith here, by the use of an analysis of one pint of milk was enabled to show what foods are best for the production of good milk. The analysis showed the fat, casein, sugar and water in the milk, in per cent, and was an excellent object lesson. He also used several charts for the purpose of pointing out the chemical constituents of the foods commonly in use. By them the carbohydrates, albuminoids, fat and crude fibre were shown in each, and directions given, for properly balancing milk and butter rations. Summed up the directions were: First, good paying cows; second, good stables and care; third properly balanced rations, liberally but judiciously fed; fourth, plenty of pure water to which free access can be had at all times; fifth, salt as free of access as the water; sixth, kindness; seventh, cleanliness in every department from the pasture or stable to the finished product. The foregoing rules closely and persistently followed will bring you profit instead of loss.

Dr. C. D. Smead followed Mr. Smith, in a paper in which some of the principal "DISEASES OF DAIRY CATTLE," were considered. Milk is secreted from the blood, if therefore, pure milk is to be given, the cow must be healthy. A diseased cow will give diseased milk, and impure food and water will produce diseases in the cow which in turn are transmitted to the milk. I give it as my opinion that more impure milk, butter and cheese comes from poor, half-starved emaciated cows, than from a want of cleanliness, and many a little grave is caused by it. The subject of food and water, then, is one of great importance. No man should offer a cow water that himself or family cannot drink. Prevention is the best remedy at all times and seasons, and constant watchfulness and the best of care coupled with properly constructed rations, with a plenty of pure water are the best cures known.


