The mining-camp depicted by Bret Harte seems to be a thing of the past.

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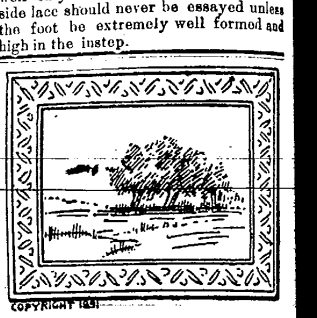
Notes for the week.
