**Around the County.**

**ALMOND.**  
Republican Supervisor, Wm. C. Benjamin, elected by a majority of 10. Entire Republican ticket elected except highway commissioner and collector. A Republican gain.

**AMITY.**  
Republican Supervisor, C. S. Whitney, elected. No opposition. The whole Republican ticket elected by large pluralities, except excise commissioner. A license commissioner was elected by a majority of 20.

**ANGELICA.**  
Republican Supervisor, F. A. Robbins, endorsed by the Democrats. The town went no license by 1 majority.

**CUBA.**  
Republican Supervisor, F. B. Sibley, elected by a plurality of 17 over Fred Lyman, Democrat. The town went no license by 101 majority.

**FRIENDSHIP.**  
Prohibition and Alliance Supervisor, M. W. Hobart, elected by a plurality of 31. The town went no license by 101 majority.

**INDEPENDENCE.**  
Republican Supervisor, Theo. Cobb, elected by a majority of 22 over N. S. Bartlett, Alliance. A. D. Howe elected town clerk with no opposition.

**SCIO.**  
Republican Supervisor, E. J. Norton, elected by a majority of 75. The whole Republican ticket elected except assessor. Town went no license by 41.

**WELLSVILLE.**  
Democratic Supervisor, O. D. Browning, elected by a majority of 3 over Russell Tremain, Republican. After a hot fight the town went for license by 31 majority.
