Myron Hollowell - Aged 102.

A few weeks ago Andover boasted of being the only town in New York state where two centenarians resided. We can no longer claim even one. The death of Gideon Hollowell, which occurred Thursday, Feb. 25, 1892, removed from earthy scenes the oldest person in this section of the county.

Mr Hollowell was born in Hartwick Conn. Sept. 20, 1789. He came to Andover forty years ago, and has made his home with his son Myron Hollowell. Until recently the deceased has been hale and hearty as a man of fifty. His voice was clear and strong, and his mind perfectly clear. He could read without difficulty, and spent much of his time reading papers, taking great interest in passing events. He has not been able to walk in eight years, on account of an accident by which his hip was broken. He was recently seized with an attack of grip, which, with a certain phase of inflammation, ended his long life.
