The Republican State Convention for electing delegates to the National Convention will be held in Albany on April 28th.

On Monday Governor Flower signed the bill appropriating \$300,000 for continuing the work on the State Capitol.

New York is the most uncertain State in the Union. It elected Grover Cleveland as Governor by nearly 200,000 majority in 1882, gave him a majority of about 1,000 for President in 1884, and gave a majority of 20,000 against him for President in 1888.

The New York World's Washington correspondent says that the Chinese government has hinted to Mr. Blaine that if the anti-Chinese bills now before Congress become laws, China will exclude from her territory all Americans, missionaries as well as those having business interests, and will sever diplomatic relations with this country.

Connecticut has a village called Tariffville. Here is a suggestion worth following by namers of towns. Instead of honoring local politicians or borrowing names from Europe or from other states, why not name a few of them after our national politics. Such names as "Civil Service Reform," "Protection," "Free Trade," "Honest Money," "Free Silver," "Prohibition," "Single Tax," "A-free-ballot-and-fair-countville," etc., would be expressive, to say the least.

The Cuba Patriot declares itself in favor of the renomination of Hon. Warren B. Hooker as member of Congress from this District. The Patriot says Mr. Hooker has made a good record in Congress, and there should be no opposition to a second term. The same paper also advocates the holding of but one Congressional convention this year. There must be a Congressional convention before April 28th to elect delegates to the State convention and the Patriot sees no reason why a nomination for Member of Congress can not be made at the same time, and thus avoid the expense of holding a second convention in the fall.

Within a year the first long distance telephone line will be completed between Chicago and New York. Before then it is expected that every one of the more than 8,000 telephones in Chicago will be replaced with copper metallic circuit instruments, by the use of which any sound can be transmitted for thousands of miles with perfect distinctness.
