Bounty on Maple Sugar.

This year our maple sugar producers eceive the bounty to which they are entitled, providing they applied for a sugar license before the first of July,

There is one point worth bearing in mind, to entitle the sugar producer to the bounty, it must be entirely pure, made from nothing but maple sap, produced within the United States since July 1, 1891, with no admixture or addition of any other material.

The weighing stations for Allegany and Steuben counties will be at Wells ville and Caneadea. The weigher will be F. J. Heath of Victor, Ontario Co.
