The 81st District Congressional Convention to elect delegates to the State and National Republican Conventions, will be held at Olean, April 26th.

The Assembly Committee on Codes has agreed to report favorably the bill of Assemblyman Stein amending the electrocution act of the State. The bill does away with the electrical chair and substitutes in its stead the old process of hanging. The bill is reported without amendment.

About the 20th of February John D. Rockefeller, the "Standard Oil King," gave one million dollars to the University of Chicago. He called it a "special thank-offering to Almighty God." Some of the leading papers in the country are loud in their condemnation as such a "thank-offering." They claim that the money given was "wring from the wreck and ruin of Rockefeller's fellow men engaged in the petroleum industry." One of the papers closes a long article on the subject in the following language:
