The horse in his development and use has in every age been a fit index of the degree of civilization of a people. The Arab and Mohammedan used the horse only for chase and war. A people like the English needed horses for bearing burdens and tilling lands, as well as for ceremony, for sport and for war.

The tastes and fashions of a monarch influenced the style and use of horses. Charles I. and II. imported the royal mares of the stud-book. James II. continued importations. William the Conqueror wanted hearier horses for war and agriculture. He imported from Normandy and Flanders. Henry VIII. was so eager to improve the horses for cavalry and agriculture that he caused horses under size to be destroyed. His reign of thirty-eight years was marked by an increase in the number and value of powerful horses and in a like improvement in agriculture and wealth of the nation.
