"Speech is silver" in the House of Representatives this week. The silver bill is up for discussion.

The great Standard Oil Trust is dissolved. At a meeting of the stockholders on Monday it was decided, by a two-thirds vote, to terminate the trust, and that all property held by the trust except stocks of corporation be sold by the trustees.

The dispatches from Albany state that the bill requiring personal registration of voters in the rural districts will be reported favorably by the Committee on General Laws, and a mighty effort will be made to pass the bill. The Member of the Legislature, be he Republican or Democrat, who votes in favor of such a bill ought to be made to walk ten miles barefooted in the kind of storms and over the kind of roads that Alleghenians have seen during the past few weeks. He would never vote for that kind of a bill again for any other.

Free Mails for Farmers.

A popular subject of discussion now among farmers is free rural mail delivery. In the successful experiments in this line made by the Post Office Department the increased expenses were met by the revenues from increased postal business. The experiments indicate that the free delivery system could be gradually extended without causing any annual deficit in the Department. It does not appear from the report that where the experiments were made the carriers had to travel over the average rugged roads of the country. It might be said that the carriers had been obliged to travel over the average roads in bad weather. The question of free rural mail delivery is closely connected with the question of road improvement. And it is quite safe to say, even in the event of the extension of the free delivery system, that there are many portions of the country not thinly settled, either, that will never see free rural mail delivery unless they make a vast improvement in public roads.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the subordinate lodges of which they were members, and published with the minutes in the local papers. Resolved, That Allegheny County Lodge extend to the members of the Scio Lodge, the W. C. T. U. and the citizens of Scio generally a hearty vote of thanks for the royal manner in which we have been entertained during this session.

After the close of the business session, the doors were thrown open

and the room was rapidly filled with the citizens of Scio, to listen to the open session of the lodge, after which we had some very interesting remarks from Rev. A. E. Phelps, evangelist, Rev. Mr. Gardiner and Rev. Mr. Place of Scio, and Rev. Mr. Burton of Belmont.
