RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

The new ballot law has passed the Assembly. It provides for a single blanket ticket with the names of nominees arranged in columns according to parties, each column to be preceded by a party emblem. The emblems, which are designed for the guidance of illiterate voters, are as follows: Republican, a star; Democratic, an eagle; Labor, an arm with the hand grasping an upraised hammer; Prohibition, a pitcher. Voters are to indicate their choice by checking the names of the nominees they prefer, or, if they want to cast a straight ticket, by making a mark near the emblem. The use of the emblem will have a tendency to do away with the practice, although the paper is still in use.
