France has enacted a stringent law by which it is prohibited (1) to give infants under one year any form of solid food unles such be ordered by a written prescription eigned by a le gal qualified medical man; (2) it is further prohibited for the nurses to use, in the rearing of infants confided to their care, at any time, under any pretext whatsoever, a bottle or bottle with tubes. Then follow the penal ties which will overtake nurses who do not conform to the above. France is as tender of infant life as the American colonies used to be, and for the same reason; it is not redundant in At a recent meeting of the Society for the Protection of Children in France, Dr. Rochard (Chairman) stated that France loses every year 250,000 infants, and that out of this number there are at least 100,000 whose lives could be saved with intelligent care. These lives were the more precious in the present period, for France could no longer afford to lose them. When he stated in 1884 that the population of France would stop increasing toward the beginning of the twentieth century, he was pooh poohed. His prophecy had been justified sooner than he had wished. The number of deaths in 1890 out-numbered the births by 38,446. It was not easy, said Dr. Rochard, to add to the hirths. but it was possible to diminish the death rate among infants. The 100,000 babes that ought to be saved every year would repopulate France.
