Twenty years ago Nebraska took the lead in Arber day observance. Four hundred mit. lion trees have been planted there. New York followed the example in 1888 when thirty four states and two territories had adopted the festival. In his address to the school children Superintendent Draper offers this suggestion: "The Connecticut Grange has begun an interesting work in preserving records of noted and historistate trees. Let us seeiff we can not do something in this way to perpetuate the histories of our grand old trees. Look out for the oldest, largest and most picturesque, trees in your district. Measure the circumference es, find out all vou can relating to them, and then sit down and send me the story by mail. No doubt many of the facts you give would be of general interest, and some of them may be printed in the Arbor day circular for 1893."
