At the post-office department a re port has just completed upon the bill recently introduced in congress to provide in a measure for the equalization of postmasters' salaries, particularly of the smaller offices. Its particular provision was fixing \$25 as the lowest limit of any salary for any postmaster. The bill is being watched with the deepest interest by the great army of fourth class postmasters. From the general tenor of the report made by the post office department it does not appear that the officials favor the measure. The report states it would cost \$7,000,000 per annum to carry out the provisions of the bill, and that sum must be added in case the bill became a law, with the post office appropriation bill for the next fiscal year. It shows that at present 47,000 postmasters receive an annual compeneation of less than \$200, and 2,000 gets less than \$100. One United States postmaster in North Carolina broke the record for the past year by getting the salary of 88 cents.
