Washington, May 2, 1892. The Blaine talk, like the silver ques heard wherever republicans congre-parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Livermore, gate. They are averse to supporting President Harrison, hecause of his well known opposition to free coinage, but they are perfectly willing to take Mr. Blaine without knowing that he is any more friendly to free coinage than Mr. Harrison is. The anti-Harrison republicans generally have also, it seems, come to the conclusion that the only way to keep Harrison out of the nomination is to nominate Mr. Blaine, and if they can have the r way the Minneap dis convention will Lominate Mr. Blaine whether he will or not.
