At the Republican-State Convention held in Albany last Thursday, the "big four"—Depew, Platt, Miller and Hiscock—were elected delegates at large from this State to the National Republican Convention. W. J. Glenn of Cuba was reelected member of the State Committee for Allegany County.

There is every probability that for the first time in the history of the United States, a woman will be a delegate to a national convention, and Wyoming will have the honor of inaugurating the custom. Miss Emma Schulte and Mrs. Fidelia Elliott of Chyenne are candidates for the position of delegate to the Republican national convention at Minneapolis. Since woman suffrage was conferred on the women of that state they have become adepts in pulling the political wires. The first step in the journey to Minneapolis has been taken in the election of the two women named as delegates from Laramie county to the state convention, which convenes to-day. It is considered probable that one of them will be selected.

In counties where school commissioners are to be elected this fall the town clerk should be instructed to furnish, besides the usual amount of truck for the voting booths, one looking glass, hair brush, comb, towel, wash bowl and water, so the fair ones may look their prettiest when they cast their ballots. *Angelica Every Week.*

The Cheese Market.

UTICA, May 2.—To-day at the board of trade the following sales of cheese were: Thirty boxes at 9 1/2%, 150 boxes at 9 1/4%, 460 boxes at 9%, 1,350 boxes at 8 3/4%, 130 boxes at 8 1/2%, 120 boxes at 10, 2,080 boxes consigned. Eighteen packages creamery butter at 19 1/2 c. Market fairly active for season of year. At Little Falls: 470 boxes at 9 1/2%, 105 boxes at 9 1/4%, 143 boxes at 9, 2,268 boxes on commission, 160 boxes dairy on commission. Forty-four packages creamery butter at 19 c., 69 packages dairy butter at 17 1/2 c.
