The ten-year traffic arrangement between the Lehigh Valley and the Erie railroads, by which the former has made use of the tracks of the Erie from Waverly, N. Y., to Buffalo, a distance of 167 miles, has expired and has been succeeded by a temporary agreement, by which the Valley road will continue on the Erie tracks until July 1. Lehigh Valley trains first began to run over the Erie tracks in 1872 and in the twenty years since the Erie has received enormous annual rentals based on the amount of traffic coming from the Lehigh Valley, and which have recently amounted to \$100,000 a month.
