Every public building was garrisoned with fifty or sixty infantry with ball cartridges in their rifles. Ousside sentinets in intervals of ten yards patrolled

tridges in their rines. Outside sentines at intervals of ten yards patrolled the streets. No civilian was allowed to approach within one hundred yards of any national or municipal building. All who wisned to go by were obliged to go round and nobody demurred, as the ex timels were known to be under strict in-structions to shoot upon slight violation of the order.

No attempt was made by workingmen No attempt was made by workinghed to hold street processions or outdoor meetings. They held, however, several monster indoor meetings with a total attendance of 100,000 or more, and at least an equal number were turned away from the overcrowded halls.

Knauff denies that Faulk was insane, and claims that Faulk killed his wife because he was jealous of a hired man. Knauff says he would have committed suicide long ago if it had not been for the disgrace of it. The old man was heartbroken, and asked to be locked up. The Coroner finally succeeded in persuading him to go home, promising him to look into the case.

The Jersey Central lease is declared to be a valid contract between two New Jersey corporations, and clearly no infringement or violation of the constitution of Pennsylvania, which cannot affect it.

The answer of the Lehigh Valley Coal and Navigation Company is an admission of its ownership of the Lehigh and Susquehanna Railroad, which it leased to the Jersey Central, but denies being a party to the agreement whereby that road was leased to the Fort Reading Company. A denial is also made for the Lebigh and Wilkesbarre Coal Company, that its mines and collieries have been leased by the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company.


