What Water Works Mean to Cuba.

The people of Cuba are pretty well satisfied with their investment for water works, which were put in about two years ago. From W. J. Penny, President of Cuba village, we get a few figures relative to the expense, income, etc. The village owns its own system of water works and is bonded for \$33,000 for its construction. The bonds draw 3 1/2 per cent interest, and were sold at a premium of \$325. The first payment on principal is due July 1, 1897, and the last in twenty years from date of issue. The expense for last year, including interest, was about \$1,200, and the income \$2,531. The income is increasing, and the expense for interest will decrease. Thus it will be seen that the investment is a paying one—for the village—as it is almost a certainty that the surplus will amount to enough to pay all the bonds a considerable time before they are due. When the bonds are paid the revenue will almost if not quite pay the entire village expenses. In the meantime, fire protection costs nothing, and insurance rates are at the lowest notch.

Who wouldn't live in a village that owns its water works?

Sunday School Association.

The Annual Convention of the Allegany County Sunday School Association will be held this year at Bolivar, May 17th and 18th.

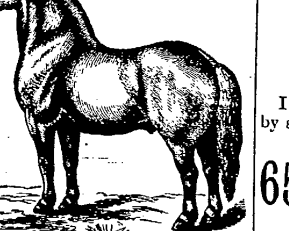
