At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

- Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and for notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
- Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged 1 ct.
- Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

A Company is being formed at Centerville to drill at test well in the hope of striking oil or gas. The discovery of the big gusher at Bliss, but a few miles from Centerville has led to this enterprise.

UTICA, May 9.—At the Utica board of trade the following sales of cheese were made: One hundred and seventy-five boxes at 9 1/2 c., 958 boxes at 9 1/2 c., 1,670 boxes at 8 3/4 c., 2,055 boxes at 10 c., 45 boxes at 10 1/2 c., 30 boxes at 10 1/4 c., 1,515 boxes consigned. Forty-three packages creamery butter at 19a19 1/2 c., marked 1/2 c. higher.

At Little Falls today the following sales were made: Two hundred and ninety-four boxes at 9 c., 210 boxes at 9 1/2 c., 750 boxes at 9 1/2 c., 300 boxes at 9 1/2 c., 308 boxes at 10 c., 50 boxes at 10 1/2 c., 820 boxes consigned, 515 boxes dairy at 9a 9 1/2 c. Forty-two packages dairy butter at 17a18c., 60 packages creamery butter at 19c.; market strong.

A Relic of 1824.

Over twelve years ago A. M. Burrows, while sorting a lot of rags which had been purchased, found an arithmetic which was once the property of Dr. Thaddeus Baker, who formerly lived in Andover. The peculiarity about the book is that it is entirely written with pen and ink presumably the work of Dr. Baker. It contains over 200 pages filled with rules, examples, etc. Mr. Burrows kept the book, and came across it awhile ago at his store in this village. It had evidently been thrown aside by some person and found its way to the rag bag. Just what the doctor's purpose was in writing the book of course is not known. He may have intended to get it printed, or the book may have been in actual use. Certainly it is a curious relic. On the cover is the name "Thaddeus Baker," and the date, "February seventh, 1824." The arithmetic is now at the News office, where anybody who wishes may see it.
