THE ANDOVER NEWS.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Rule 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Rule 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged 2-1.

Rule 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

The state undertakers' association will meet in convention at Buffalo June 11th, 15th and 16th. About 800 delegates are expected.

Hyper Warfield, who has "pulled the throttle" on the tannery cart for the past twelve years, has resigned the position. W. E. Green takes his place.
