

Blaine May Accept.

Last Friday's Buffalo Express contained the following despatch from Washington: The Capitol fairly buzzed with political gossip to-day. The Republican leaders were all agog over a rumor that Secretary Blaine at last had yielded to the enormous pressure that recently had been brought to bear upon him and has given a conditional consent to the use of his name at Minneapolis—the condition being that his nomination must come without a struggle and as the expression of the practically unanimous demand of the party and of the convention. This rumor reached the Capitol at an early hour and spread like wildfire throughout the building. It was traced to New York and is credited with high authority. This subject formed the topic of conversation among the various groups of Republican Congressmen this morning. Representative Boutelle of Maine, who is one of the closest friends of the brilliant Secretary, is understood to be responsible for the story. Naturally this sudden rise in the Blaine boom is delightful to the anti-Harrison leaders and especially those in the Senate. One of the shrewdest Republican politicians in the country said this afternoon that a campaign had been begun to compel Blaine—if compulsion were possible—to say that he would accept the nomination, if offered him by the Minneapolis convention. A schedule had been arranged and in accordance with this two or three Republicans were calling upon the Secretary each day to insist upon his being the party's candidate. This, he said, would be kept up until it was time for the crowd to go to Minneapolis, but even then the work would be kept going in a mild degree by a few who will remain in the city.

60,000 Drunkards "Treated."

Dr. Keeley said his cure was a system, and he could not afford to let every physician know it; they could not for several reasons, familiarize themselves with it. Another thing, he said, he did not want the thing to get into the hands of "more quacks than those who now claimed to possess it."

Dr. Keeley sailed for Europe on Wednesday to introduce his remedy.

An Aged Lady Killed at Cuba.

Mrs. Clarissa Chamberlain of North Cuba, was run over by the way freight at the W. N. Y. & P. crossing on Canal street, Cuba, about 8 o'clock Thursday morning. The Patriot says Mrs. Chamberlain was coming to Cuba on foot, and had reached the railroad crossing where the crew of the freight train were engaged in some work on the Ackerly, Sill & Co. switch. The train was cut in two, and the old lady asked one of the hands if she might cross. She was told no, but doubtless after waiting a minute, decided that it was safe to try it, and had almost reached the opposite side of the track when she was struck by the caboose. The wheels passed over both legs, cutting them almost off, and the right hand was badly crushed. Dr. Champney was hastily summoned, but medical aid was of no avail. She was removed to the depot and died in about ten minutes, death being caused more by the shock than the injuries. No blame is attached to any of the railroad employees. Deceased was 88 years of age.

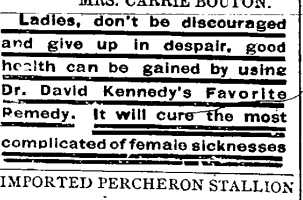
