Fennimore's Odd Well.

There is, not far from Fennimore, Wis, a peculiar well, which at present is but little known. It is about 80 feet deep, the lower 40 feet being drilled. About 20 feet from the surface there enters a crevice, out of which forms. rushes a current of air with force so great as to be felt at the top of the well, and a temperature so low as to well, and a temperature which enters on the opposite side about 5 feet above the crevice.
