ANDOVER, N. Y., June 8, 1892.

James G. Blaine resigned the office of Secretary of State last Saturday. This is taken as evidence that Blaine now considers himself in the Presidential race.

There should be no politics in dealing with a petition presented to the U. S. Senate, by Senator Hiscock last week, signed by some of the most prominent citizens of New York, members of all political parties, calling attention to the easy naturalization of foreign born citizens in New York, and asking that a committee be appointed to inquire into the methods of these citizenship-while-you-wait mills, conducted by political bosses with the aid and connivance of judges with elastic consciences. Neither party is guiltless of the charge of making voters to order by this method. The more difficult the attainment of American citizenship is made the more highly it will be prized by those who attain it.

On Friday last the House of Representatives voted that the government exhibit at the World's Columbian Exposition shall not be open to the public on Sunday. This indicates the attitude of Congress on the subject of Sunday closing, and makes it probable that a requirement that the whole exposition shall be closed on Sunday will be made a condition of any further appropriation. So Sabbath desecration apparently is not to become one of the features of the great world's fair. It will exhibit an American, not a continental, Sabbath. This decision will occasion the rejoicing of the Christian people of the whole land. But there is another side to the picture. The saloon and beer garden owners of Chicago are said to be equally in favor of closing the exhibition on Sunday. If it is closed the great crowds will be more likely to patronize these places of resort.

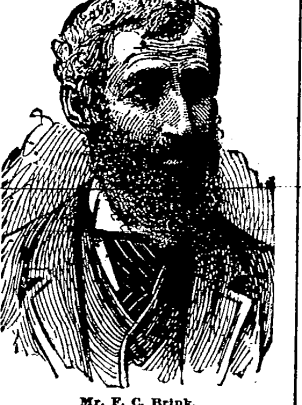

RESOLUTIONS: That notices of thanks be charged 5c. RESOLUTIONS: That obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.

Under the new excise law an entrance is made in the civil damage formerly damages for death or injury could be collected from the proprietor or owner of saloon property if person injured or killed had partaken of liquor upon the premises within a short time previous to the accident.
