THE ANDOVER NEWS.

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to be effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:
RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged 5¢.
RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than cents per line.

Mrs. H. Mourhess attended the funeral of Martin Briggs of Genesee Fork, on Sunday. Mr. Briggs died on Friday June 3, 1892. The funeral was largely attended and was held in North Bingham, Pa., where the interment took place.

On Monday of this week the Buffalo Morning Express was enlarged to eight column pages, and the price reduced six dollars a year. The Express reaches Andover by mail on train 29 (1:10 p. m.) and is unquestionably the best paper that arrives here the same day that it is printed.

Under the new excise law an entire change is made in the civil damage act. Formerly damages for death or injury could be collected from the proprietor of a saloon or owner of saloon property if the person injured or killed had partaken of liquor upon the premises within a short time previous to the accident. Under the present law the drunkard must be "posted" by a written notice before damages can be collected.

We regret to learn of the death of Mrs. W. D. Moulton, wife of the editor of the Cuba Patriot. Her death occurred Wednesday and her age was 26 years. Mr. Moulton will have the heartfelt sympathy of every member of the newspaper fraternity in this section.

Mr. Jeremiah Linnehan of Hornellsville and Miss Mary Patten, daughter of Brian Patten of this place, were married at the Church of the Holy Sacrament this morning by Rev. Father Haire of Belfast. The newly married couple will go to Cleveland, O. for a brief stay. Their numerous friends extend congratulations.

S. G. Waffle of Elm Valley has a herd of native cows which are giving an average of 34 pounds of milk per day each. He claims that native cows are as valuable for milk as blooded stock. His cows came in early and he realized over \$100 in calves and butter before the cheese factory opened. Mr. Waffle wants to know of a herd that beats this record.

Thursday afternoon while farmer Henry Dayton and Sydney Hopkins, who reside at West Creek, about four miles west of Avoca, were engaged in washing a flock of sheep, lightning struck the flock, killing thirty sheep and badly injuring Mr. Hopkins in the right side and leg. His foot is in very bad condition and without doubt he will be crippled for life.

M. W. Pike, one of the most wealthy and best known of Belmont's citizens died Tuesday evening, May 31. He has been helpless for more than two years, and his death had been expected for some time. Mr. Pike was a public spirited man if there is one in this county, and many are the good deeds he has done for church, village and individual. He was 72 years of age.

Hon. A. W. Miner, one of the most widely known and highly respected citizens of Friendship, died quite suddenly and unexpectedly at his home last week Monday evening. He was in his usual health, and in his accustomed way was busy and interested in Memorial Day exercises. At 1 o'clock he was at the cemetery, and not feeling very well he went home and laid down and at 5 o'clock he died. His death is a great loss to the county.

The double scull race between Hanlan and O'Connor and Teemer and Hosmer for the championship of the world, will be rowed at the Erie, Pa., regatta which takes place June 22 and 23. The principal features of the regatta are as follows: Wednesday June 22—Single scull race open to the world for a purse of \$500, divided. Hanlan, O'Connor, Teemer, Hosmer and others have entered. Thursday June 23—Double scull race for the championship of the world and \$1,000 a side with \$1,500 added money between Hanlan and O'Connor, and Teemer and Hosmer.

Commencement Exercises.

Commencement exercises of the Andover Union School will be held Tuesday, June 23 at Prest's opera house. The usual school entertainment will be given at 2 o'clock p. m. The graduating exercises will take place at 7:30 p. m. after which will occur the banquet given by the Alumni Association. The graduating exercises this year will be somewhat different from usual, and will consist of a review of the history of the United States, with scenes illustrative of the different periods of our history. The entertainment in the afternoon, also, will be in some respects different from that which our people are used to seeing. In fact Commencement this year will be of unusual interest to all, and the public may expect a rich program, well carried out.

A Narrow Escape.

Clayton Green, an employe of the terra cotta works at Alfred Centre, met with a thrilling experience Sunday. The little creek which runs close to the terra cotta works rose so rapidly that large quantities of driftwood came down and was causing the water to bother the works. While assisting to clear away the obstruction Green fell into the swift current and was carried down about a quarter of a mile. He was wedged between the driftwood and remained in the water about 40 minutes before he could be rescued.

Mrs. Mary E. Smith.

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Smith died of paralysis June 1st, 1892, at her home near Andover. Her maiden name was Knapp. She was born June 9th, 1800, in Beekman, Dutchess Co., N. Y. She lived some time in Cayuga Co. and removed from there to Andover in 1841, and lived on the place now occupied by her son nearly a quarter of a century. Her husband, Mr. A. Smith, died in 1892. Five children survive them, three sons in Andover, one son in Ohio and one daughter in Belmont. She was a member of the Baptist church and responded to our last roll call. Of late she had become blind, in consequence remained much at home, ministered to faithfully by loving hands. Though the light of this world was shut out from her, she yet rejoiced in the inner Light of the Sun of Righteousness, so that in her darkness she had Light.

Funeral services were held at the house, Friday June 3d. Many neighbors and friends were in attendance.
