The prediction is freely made that Tom Platt will not cut much of a figure in politics hereafter. And Fassett, too, seems to have been too ungrateful to Harrison to suit most people.

Week before last the Angelica Republican said that Blaine was "predestinated to be President." We move to amend the proposition by inserting the word "not" (in italics) before the word "to."

The Democratic National Convention meets in Chicago next Tuesday. The strength of the different candidates has been estimated as follows: Hill 336, Cleveland 453, Palmer 48, Carlisle 35, Boies 26. Number of delegates 898. Necessary to a choice 599. Most of the states will vote as a unit and if this is done Hill's vote will be reduced to 215 and Cleveland's increased to 577, or within 22 of the requisite number. In this event either the vote of Kentucky, Iowa or Illinois would nominate the ex President unless South Carolina and Virginia, whose delegations are claimed to be equally divided, should cast their 42 votes for Hill. This contingency is considered remote, however, by Hill supporters, as they intend that every delegate shall know the exact situation long before a ballot is taken.

Don't invest in Strange Horses.

The following from the Bath Advertiser shows the folly of being taken in by trading for horses which you do not know are owned by the parties having possession of them:

"Alva Scott, a farm laborer, employed by a Mr. Woodard, who lives on Sugar Hill, in Schuyler county, four miles from Bradford, arranged with his employer the 28th ult., to use his farm team to come to Bath, and with his wife spend Sunday with his father-in-law, W. A. Butler. Mr. and Mrs. Scott arrived in Bath that evening, a week ago Saturday, and stayed overnight at Mr. Butler's on Bonny Hill. Sunday the 29th Scott was here in the village trying to trade his horses, and on Memorial Day he drove them to Kanona and arranged a trade with Allen & Monell for one of their work teams, receiving thirty dollars 'to boot.' Woodard became uneasy because Scott did not return, and so came to Bath twice in search of his horses, and on Thursday located them at Kanona, where he learned of the trade Scott had made with Allen & Monell. Deputy Sheriff Dudley was at once put on the case and Friday morning found one horse with the harness, robes, etc., in the stable at Clark Bros., at Hornellsville, where Scott had left it; and taking the better horse and a buggy had continued on into Allegany county. Saturday morning at Belmont the horse and buggy were found, but no trace of Scott could be discovered as he had left Belmont on a west bound train, purchasing no ticket at the station. He is probably in Pennsylvania. The horses procured at Kanona have been returned to Allen & Monell and Mr. Woodard's horses are again in his possession."

At a meeting of the Allegany County Publishers' Association, held at Bolivar, April 29, 1892, the following rules were unanimously adopted to take effect the week beginning May 9, 1892:

Article 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.

Article 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.

Article 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for at not less than 5 cents per line.
