Great damage by wind and lightning is reported in the adjacent country; but, owing to the almost impassable condition of the roads...

During the storm lightning struck the house of James Lolly at West Ocean Grove, shattering it badly.

Mrs. Lolly was struck by a falling brick from the chimney as she rushed out into the back yard.

The back of her head and neck were so badly cut that her recovery is doubtful.
