

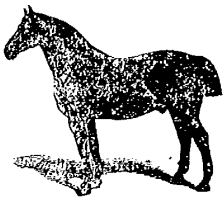

BOMB-THROWING IN WOODHULL.

A Methodist Minister's House Bombed by a Cowardly Gañg.

A correspondent of the Elmira Gazette writes as follows from Woodhull, Steuben county:

This place is in a turmoil of excitement, over an attack made upon the Methodist parsonage at midnight the night before the Fourth, and the accompanying denouements. Some time ago Rev. Mr. Mulford got four residents indicted for violation of the excise law. The town is no-license. They pleaded guilty and were fined. He has pushed his reform ideas along every line, to such an extent that "horses" at dice and quiet games of "poker" have become scarcer than hen's teeth. Many persons have been compelled to drink water straights, when the whole inner man yearned for just a drop or two of medication.

There are some who feel called upon to revolt against this extraordinary state of affairs, and they have laid siege to the Reverend Mulford in season and out of season. A year ago his garden was pulled up and destroyed. In other ways he has been annoyed. The climax was reached, however, Sunday night when the parsonage was bombarded with cannon fire crackers and Chinese bombs.

A bomb ten inches long and three inches thick was hurled through a window, smashing the large glass. It landed within a few feet of the beds occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Mulford and two small children and exploded with a report that shook the house. Five feet over the carpet, blazing up in the bed to an end sitting room; and also igniting the bedding where a boy of six was sleeping. Two older children came running from another room screaming with terror.

Mrs. Mulford took the children in charge, while the preacher got his rifle, loaded it, and went out on guard outside. A renewal of the attack was made. One man suddenly discovered that he was in range of the "gospel gun" and took French leave. Neighbors came to the rescue. The night of the Fourth four armed men guarded the premises. Great indignation is expressed. It will go hard with the bomb-thrower if he is identified. Those who made up the crowd of six or eight implicated in the cowardly attack need severe punishment.

Last night the trustees of the Methodist church and a number of leading citizens met and resolved to investigate the outrage. The church has retained D. M. Darrin, an Addison attorney, as counsel in the matter, with instructions to press it, no matter who may be involved. He is here to-day.

Those who know Rev. Uri Mulford best, are sure that he is not lacking in nerve and backbone to hold his ground under the circumstances. He is exceedingly zealous, and whether or not his methods are popular with those he antagonizes, the fact remains that his motives are beyond criticism. The people hereabouts do not have sympathy for bomb-throwers.

Detected too Late.

The following, which appeared in the Wellsville Daily Reporter of Saturday last, is republished in the News by request of Mr. Truman:

EDITOR REPORTER:—Undoubtedly, many of the readers of the Reporter recollect the circumstance of a libel published in the Reporter April 18, 1888, as an advertisement, requested to be published until further notice, mailed at Alfred Centre, by some unsuspected villain, and signed A. M. Truman, thereby putting myself in debt to the amount of \$5.00. The whole thing was a libel from beginning to end, making a clear case of misdemeanor, penalty for such crime \$500 fine and one year imprisonment.

I immediately got possession of the written copy and have carried it ever since, thinking perhaps it might come handy some time never suspecting any person until the Wellsville fair of 1889, at which time my stallion and get were entered in sole competition with Melville Niles' stallion and get. His horse won first cash prize, mine second cash prize and first diploma on his get.

The following circumstance caused me to suspect (but smothered the thought as soon as possible.) The next day after judging, the judge said to myself and others, that the reason he gave the white horse first cash prize was because he was an imported and registered horse and the bay was not. My next suspicion and conclusion was in the first issue of Niles' advertisement of his stallion in Andover News, March 1892, in connection with which, I mentioned a libel on myself, and mentioned my stallion in synonymous terms with those used in the forged article, so that there could be no question but what he was the guilty person.

I then corresponded with Niles through a third party, getting a good old fashioned answer to my numerous and varied questions, thereby getting a splendid copy of his handwriting which compared to a dot with the libel of 1888. I also secured all the copies of his articles of libel and advertisements at the Andover News office, (he having all of his printing done at that office.) Every letter, imperfect grammar, and misspelled words corresponded exactly as near as a photograph. I have shown these papers to thirty-seven different persons, comprising editors, foremen, bankers, county and town clerks, lawyers and eighteen jurymen. Not one person in the thirty-seven expressed a single word of doubt but what the man that wrote one article wrote all of them the libel of 1888 included.

But as luck would have it in proceeding with the case, it was discovered that detection was too late for conviction. Consequently Mr. Niles will be seen with the Mushroom stallion, traveling over the hills of the several townships as usual, looking after the interests of the breeders of the Mushroom stock.
