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VICINITY NEWS.

Some Things That Have Happened Within One or Two Hundred Miles of Here.

The Friendship Creamery makes 1,400 pounds of butter each week.

There are good prospects that the Lackawanna & Southwestern railroad running through Angelica, will soon be operated again.

Sheriff Sherman has just returned from North Dakota. He went there to arrest one "Sute" Bemis, indicted last June for forgery. The Sheriff found Bemis at work in a livery stable.

James Morse, who was struck by a train on the Erie at Cuba a few days ago and thought to be seriously injured at the time, is now considered out of danger. He was thrown higher than the train and about thirty feet away.

During the storm Thursday afternoon lightning struck the residence of Peter Freeman, on Messera Hill, about two miles from Wellsville, demolishing the chimney, tearing up shingles and undressing his grandchild in the twinkling of an eye and not serious if not fatally injuring her.

Minors will begin in a few days by the Lehigh salt mining company at Lehigh. The shaft has passed through 28 feet of salt formation and 150 tons of lump salt have been brought out. The company will put in a 2700 electric light plant to light the building, and, perhaps the shaft.

Grand Master James T. Clark of the Grand Lodge of the State of New York, has received a letter dated July 12, to the effect that he is notified that the delegates to the Grand Lodge of the State of New York will meet at the Masonic temple at Cuba, N. Y., on August 5th next. It is expected that the gathering will be the largest ever known in Masonic circles in this state.

Truck No. 11 of the Southwest Pennsylvania Pipe Line Company, six miles from Washington, Pa., was struck by lightning during a thunder storm Thursday. It contained 27,000 barrels of oil. When it burst the burning fluid spread to other tanks, and soon 20 other tanks were on fire. Three hundred men were employed in making embankments to keep the burning oil within bounds.

Miss Cora Ashley, of Honeoye, a prepossessing girl of twenty-three, drowned herself recently in Honeoye creek. The body was found in the water at the foot of the lake in a kneeling position, and in such shallow water that not even the back of her clothing was wet. No cause can be given for the strange act. It is a singular fact, however, that thirteen years ago her mother committed suicide in the same manner in the creek near her home.

The Lackawanna hotel which stood near the Erie depot at Canaseraga was burned Friday. It is believed that the fire originated from a spark of a locomotive on the Lackawanna road, which passed some time before. The depot of the Lackawanna road is in the rear of the hotel and as there is no fire apparatus, there was no possible way of saving the structure. The proximity of the hotel to the Erie depot made it a very difficult task to save that building.

Harris, the 14 year-old son of the Rev. F. K. Fowler, pastor of the First Baptist church of Olean, was drowned in the river near Allegany Wednesday afternoon. Harris and a younger brother, Monroe, were attending a Sunday School picnic, with several other companions went bathing. Monroe got beyond his depth and Harris went to his assistance. Monroe succeeded in reaching shore, but Harris sank before help could reach him. His body was quickly recovered, but all efforts to resuscitate him were unsuccessful.

Little Minnie Murray, the 5-year-old daughter of John and Mary Murray of Fairview avenue, Jamestown, met with a horrible death while playing with her little companions Thursday afternoon. The children had started a bonfire and little Minnie attempted to jump over it, when her clothing caught in the flame and was immediately ignited. Before assistance could be obtained the clothing had almost burned off the child's body. She was taken inside and Dr. Wm. M. Bemus summoned, but he was unable to save the child's life, and she died about 8:30 in the evening.
